Acts 4:23-31

After their release Peter and John went back to their own people

and reported what the chief priests and elders had told

And when they heard it,

they raised their voices to God with one accord and said, "Sovereign Lord, maker of heaven and earth and the sea and all that is in them, you said by the Holy Spirit

through the mouth of our father David, your servant:

Why did the Gentiles rage and the peoples entertain folly? The kings of the earth took their stand and the princes gathered together against the Lord and against his anointed.

"Indeed they gathered in this city against your holy servant Jesus whom you anointed, Herod and Pontius Pilate, together with the Gentiles and the peoples of Israel, to do what your hand and your will had long ago planned to take place.

And now, Lord, take note of their threats, and enable your servants to speak your word with all boldness, as you stretch forth your hand to heal, and signs and wonders are done through the name of your holy servant Jesus."

As they prayed, the place where they were gathered shook, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit

Jn 3:1-8

There was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews

and continued to speak the word of God with boldness.

He came to Jesus at night and said to him,

"Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God,

for no one can do these signs that you are doing unless God is with him."

Jesus answered and said to him,

"Amen, amen, I say to you,

unless one is born from above, he cannot see the Kingdom of God."

Nicodemus said to him,

"How can a man once grown old be born again? Surely he cannot reenter his mother's womb and be born again, can he?"

Jesus answered,

"Amen, amen, I say to you, unless one is born of water and Spirit he cannot enter the Kingdom of God. What is born of flesh is flesh

and what is born of spirit is spirit.

Do not be amazed that I told you,

'You must be born from above.'

The wind blows where it wills,

and you can hear the sound it makes,

but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes:

so it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit."

Peter and John had just been released from a hearing before the Sanhedrin because of their healing of the beggar. The Sanhedrin was confounded by their bold Gospel message and released Peter & John admonishing them not to preach in Jesus' name. Yeah...right!

Peter & John go straight to their people and proclaim the victory of the Gospel:

"Lord...enable your servants to speak your word with all boldness, as you stretch forth your hand to heal, and signs and wonders are done through the name of your holy servant Jesus."

There is a little theophany, a manifestation of God, affirming them by their place being shaken. When this happens in scripture, we're supposed to take notice of something significant.

Nicodemeus' curiosity gives Jesus the opportunity to proclaim what is of the Kingdom. What reality is really real?

Nicodemeus is talking about wombs and Jesus is talking about our real nature-from above.

We are called to more than to come and go on this planet. Jesus points to baptism and the life in the spirit. This is nothing less than moral regeneration and a transformed lifestyle.

We who are heirs to the Kingdom: how does our baptism and life in the spirit transform our lives into "one from above:"

Be bold. Be of the spirit.
