

About Jubilate Deo Youth Schola

A schola cantorum (i.e., “school of singers”) dedicated to the musical treasures of the Catholic Church, the Jubilate Deo Youth Schola was started during Lent of 2014 by a small group of families who desired that our children learn to sing the music of the Church. We began with a pilot project to learn the Gregorian chant, *Regina Caeli*, for Easter. During this project, the small group learned several songs, participated in two Basilica Masses, and sang at the May Crowning. The project was clearly worthwhile; thus, we decided to make it official. The Jubilate Deo Youth Schola joyfully resides at the beautiful Basilica of Sts. Peter and Paul in Chattanooga, Tennessee, and we welcome new members each year.

The Latin words “Jubilate Deo,” meaning *shout joyfully to God, or give joy to God*, guide our efforts. Our mission is inspired by the long line of popes, from Pope St. Gregory the Great to Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, who have encouraged the preservation and singing of Gregorian chant and other truly sacred music in the Church universal throughout the centuries. Our name comes from the collection of chants entitled *Jubilate Deo*, which Pope Paul VI issued in 1974 as a personal gift to the Church, while encouraging that all the faithful make the effort to learn them. We aim to answer this call by discovering and embracing the chants from *Jubilate Deo* as our core repertory and sharing them within our homes, our parish, and potentially other outreach venues, so that our families and the faithful in our community can know them, too. Beyond this core repertory, we will continually adopt other beloved chants and songs in both English and Latin.

Initially, our focus is learning the essential skills of good unison singing of sacred music. As we grow and develop, we occasionally add simple harmony. We have also expanded our repertory to include classics by some of history’s great composers. We will eventually learn to sing sacred polyphony. Come join us as we embark on a journey to discover the musical treasures of the Catholic Church!

Membership

Jubilate Deo Youth Schola is open to girls and boys with unchanged voices in grades 2 - 12 who can read our song lyrics independently. Students with musical experience catch on more quickly; however, the essentials of singing the core songs are taught during the rehearsals. Younger, less experienced students can learn many of the melodies by heart and will contribute to the group singing more as they increase their skills. Older, experienced students can make an immediate, valuable contribution to the group and will have the chance to study the music in-depth.

Much of the music we study is ancient and in the public domain, freely printable, and with free online recordings available to listen to, allowing us to minimize our costs. We do request a nominal fee, currently \$40 annually (\$100 cap per family), to defray costs of the program. If this is a burden for your family, arrangements can be made for the parish to subsidize this fee. Additionally, we will sometimes recommend CD’s or other books that are worthwhile for you to purchase for home practice.

Participation in the Jubilate Deo Youth Schola is a musical enrichment experience closely integrated with the church. The program can be an important component of a student’s overall music education, but it is not intended to provide comprehensive musical training. Students are encouraged to pursue outside music classes or private lessons to ensure they receive a well-rounded music education.

Schedule

As a youth “school of singers” in the church, our primary focus is the cultivation of church singers through weekly classes/rehearsals, practice at home with our families, and congregational singing. *Jubilate Deo*



meets during the school year every Friday at 4:15 p.m. in the Varallo Parish Hall at the Basilica of Sts. Peter and Paul. At each rehearsal, we practice singing skills, study new songs, and review our current repertoire. On First Fridays and during Lent when Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is taking place in the church, we go into the church at the end of class and sing during the Benediction at 5:30. On other Fridays, we finish class right at 5:30pm.

We have a Boys' Breakout session for a few minutes on some Fridays, led by Fr. Carter. The boys learn "surprise" songs that the full group is not learning. This gives them a chance to build solidarity and confidence in their important role as male singers of the church. The girls work on harmony parts of other pieces during this time.

We also sometimes offer pre-class sessions or extra practices to give individual voice coaching or practice choral parts.

The Jubilate Deo Youth Schola participates in the sacred music ministry at the Basilica of Sts. Peter and Paul. We sing one or two songs at an Ordinary Form Mass and an Ancient Form Missa Cantata every month, and we participate in parish concerts and celebrations such as the May Crowning, the Corpus Christi procession, and the Living Rosary. We also do an annual Christmas caroling presentation in the community. Future opportunities might include a youth recital. We hope to also join in song with other scholae cantorum in the area. Eventually, we would like to collaborate to develop a summer workshop.

Thursday, August 14, 2014: Jubilate Deo sings *Salve Regina* chant at the 5:30pm Mass of the Feast of the Assumption of Mary.

Sunday, September 7, 2014: Jubilate Deo sings at our 6:00 p.m. parish concert in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Songs will include *Ave Maria* and *Concordi Laetitia* (English lyrics)

Sunday, October 5, 2014: Living Rosary at 4pm – Rosary, the singing of Marian hymns by Jubilate Deo, performances of vocal and instrumental solos by the youth, along with dinner

Saturday, November 1, 2014: Jubilate Deo sings the Litany of Saints at the parish All Saints costume party

Sunday, November 23, 2014: Jubilate Deo sings *Christ the King* at the 11:30 Mass to honor the feast day. Our accompanist, Eleonore Porter, has her debut on the basilica pipe organ.



Sunday, December 14, 2014: For Gaudete Sunday of Advent, Jubilate Deo sings *Jesus, Jesus, Come to Me*, accompanied by Eleonore Porter, and *Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming*, in three-part harmony at the 11:30 Mass.

Sunday, December 25, 2014: Jubilate Deo sings at the basilica's inaugural ancient form Mass of Christmas Day: *Resonet in Laudibus*, *Puer Natus in Bethlehem*, *Alma Redemptoris Mater*, and *Adeste, Fideles*.

Sunday, January 4, 2015: Jubilate Deo sings at the 11:30 Epiphany Mass: *Resonet in Laudibus* and *O Dear Little Children*, in two-part harmony

All Fridays during Lent 2015: Jubilate Deo sang at the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and then sang Lenten prelude songs before the Stations of the Cross.

Sunday, February 15, 2015: Jubilate Deo introduces the joyful canon that has become our theme song, *Jubilate Deo*, by Michael Praetorius, in three-part harmony, to celebrate the last Sunday before Lent.

Sunday, February 22, 2015: Jubilate Deo sings at the ancient form Mass of the First Sunday of Lent on the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter: *Attende Domine*, *Tu Es Petrus*, and *Ave Regina Caelorum*.

Sunday, March 15, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang *O Salutaris Hostia*, accompanied on the organ by Eleonore Porter, for Laetare Sunday.

Sunday, March 22, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang for the ancient form Mass of Passion Sunday: *Jesu, Dulcis Memoria* and *Ave Regina Caelorum*.

Sunday, April 19, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang the Easter song: *Alleluia, Haec dies / Lapis revolutus est* at the 11:30 Mass.

Sunday, April 26, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang for the ancient form Mass of the Third Sunday after Easter: *Concordi Laetitia*, *Alleluia, Haec dies*, and *Regina Caeli*.

Sunday, May 10, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang Marian hymns and antiphons as part of the May Crowning service

Sunday, May 17, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang on Ascension Sunday: *O Maria, Virgo Pia* and *Regina Caeli*

Sunday, May 23, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang for the ancient form Mass of Pentecost Sunday: the *Veni, Sancte Spiritus* antiphon and *Regina Caeli*.

Sunday, June 7, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang Eucharistic hymns in Latin and English for the parish Corpus Christi procession around the block, and the Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament that followed.

Sunday, June 28, 2015: Jubilate Deo sang *Tu Es Petrus* at the Basilica's 125th Anniversary of the dedication of our building, celebrating the Solemnity of Sts. Peter and Paul.
