

We invite you to participate in the Holy Eucharist daily at the times specified on the front of this bulletin. If you have not had the opportunity to make your Holy Communion, please contact the Parish Office.

Confirmation Sponsors

Must be 16 years old, registered as an adult and be confirmed in the Catholic Church. If you are married, your marriage must be recognized by the church. This is especially important if you wish to be a Sponsor for Confirmation. It takes six months of attending Mass to be eligible for this privilege.

Marriage

The common policy of marriage requires that arrangements with the church be made at least one year before the date of marriage and before any social plans are made. Either the Bride or Groom must be a registered parishioner. If you would like to get more information about getting married, please contact the Parish Office.

Bishop James F. Checchio

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Let us continue our journey to learn ever better to pray as Jesus taught us. We must pray as he taught us to pray.

He said: when you pray, go quietly into your room, withdraw from the world, and turn to God by calling him 'Father!'. Jesus does not want his disciples to be like the hypocrites who pray while standing in the squares to be admired by the people (cf. Mt 6:5). Jesus does not want hypocrisy. True prayer is that done in the secret of the conscience, of the heart: inscrutable, visible only to God. God and I. It shuns falsehood: with God it is impossible to pretend. It is impossible; there are no tricks that have any power before God. God knows us like this, naked in one's conscience, and there can be no pretense. At the root of the dialogue with God, there is a silent dialogue. Like the glance between two people in love: man's gaze meets God's, and this is prayer. Looking at God and allowing yourself to be looked upon by God: this is prayer. "But, Father, I do not say any words...". Look at God and let yourself be looked upon by him: it is a prayer, a beautiful prayer!

To continue...the only other time chrism is used is when a church is consecrated and an altar. The church and altar are permanently set aside for divine worship. The altar is marked permanently as a symbol of Christ, hence during Mass, when we pass by the altar we bow towards it in reverence. It is also marked as the sacred place which makes Christ present in our world through the eucharistic sacrifice which occurs on it each day.

Jesus becomes truly present to us, body, blood, soul and divinity on the altar. It is on the altar where we witness a truly blessed event, where heaven and earth come together, where Divine meets human, and as we receive Jesus' Body and Blood, we pray that we become more like Jesus, taking on His eyes, His way of hearing and loving others. I was honored to be in Flemington for the consecration where our God will come to Flemington to nourish the faithful, support them and love them, as He does in your parish each day, too. We are blessed with a God who is always seeking us out, trying to break more fully into our lives, even with His own presence. I try to emulate and share that love of our God with you as your bishop, so know of my love for you, too, and my gratitude for you. Questions and Answers Concerning the Release of Names of Credibly Accused Roman Catholic Clergy in New Jersey, February 13, 2019

What are the Roman Catholic Dioceses of New Jersey releasing?

The Roman Catholic Dioceses of New Jersey are releasing the names of priests and deacons against whom a credible allegation of sexual abuse of a minor has been made and reported to one of the five Dioceses. The lists were compiled from the records maintained by the five Dioceses. All of the names released already have been reported to appropriate law enforcement agencies, including the county prosecutors.

What is the definition of a credible allegation?

A credible allegation is one that after a review of available and relevant information, there is reason to believe the allegation is true.

What is the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People?

The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People is a comprehensive set of procedures for addressing allegations of sexual abuse of minors by Catholic clergy. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops established the Charter in 2002, and revised the Charter in 2005, 2011, and 2018. The Bishops' annual meeting at which the Charter was first approved took place in Dallas, and so the Charter is sometimes referred to as the "Dallas Charter."

What is the definition of a minor for the purposes of this list?

A minor is anyone under the age of 18 at the time the alleged abuse occurred.

Have the clergy included on this list been reported to law enforcement?

Yes, for over twenty years, the New Jersey Catholic Dioceses have endeavored to report all child sexual abuse to county prosecutors or local police agencies. The Dioceses have memorialized that commitment in a Memorandum of Understanding between the Dioceses and the New Jersey Division of Criminal Justice. On December 2, 2002, the Division of Criminal Justice described its agreement with the Dioceses as "the most comprehensive and precise agreement of its kind in the nation."

The Division of Criminal Justice said that the Memorandum of Understanding between the Dioceses and the 21 county prosecutors "accomplished the overriding goal of protecting victims of sexual offenses and other vulnerable members of society, while ensuring that prosecutors be provided with all relevant information regarding allegations of sexual assault – whether past, present or future."

Why are the Dioceses releasing the names at this time?

The list is being published as part of the five Dioceses' ongoing commitment to transparency and to encourage persons sexually abused by clergy to come forward. Additionally, the disclosure of the names is part of the Dioceses' ongoing efforts to promote healing for all victims of child sexual abuse.

What does the Church do to protect Children?

All New Jersey Dioceses have fully implemented comprehensive safe environment programs and together have trained more than 2.3 million adults, children, employees, clergy and volunteers. The Dioceses have conducted over 380,000 background checks on all Diocesan and parish personnel who have regular contact with children. The Dioceses remain vigilant to ensure a safe environment for every child we serve.

Do the Dioceses listen to victims?

Yes, no victim is ignored. The Dioceses listen to all victims and attempt to help them on the road to healing whenever and however possible. The Dioceses strive to settle all claims of victims involving priests, deacons, or others where abuse has been established. Together the Dioceses have paid more than \$50 million in settlements - \$38 million of which were to victims whose claims were beyond the time limits allowed by the current statute of limitations.

What should I do if I suspect a priest or church employee has engaged in sexual abuse of a child?

Anyone who has reasonable cause to believe that a child is being or has been abused should notify law enforcement immediately.
