At beginning of Mass:

Welcome, one and all! I'm so very happy to be here with you, on this beautiful August, summer day, to celebrate our Faith, our Families, and our Friendship with one another for this Hispanic Diocesan Fiesta! It's great to have all our priests here with us: Fathers Evelio, Raul, Oscar, Leo, and Danielle, along with Deacon Alberto; and our dear Sisters

We are here to give thanks to God for His Love for all of us, and for always providing for our needs, through His unconditional Love for us, for His constant Mercy and Forgiveness of our sins, and for being our spiritual Food and Drink in the Gift of the Holy Eucharist.

Let us now prepare to celebrate these Sacred Mysteries by calling to mind our sins:

Homily:

This Annual Diocesan Fiesta is such a joyful and happy event, which brings so many of us together from many different places----our own individual families coming together as the much larger Catholic Family----so that we can celebrate this "Day of the Family", and our shared Faith in Jesus Christ, in this Holy Mass! The Scripture Readings we just listened to from God's Holy Word speak directly to each of our hearts, and remind us, clearly and lovingly, how much God wants us to respond to His invitation to come to Him---to live our lives according to His ways---to be in "communion with" Him!

In the First Reading from the Book of Proverbs, God spoke to us using the name of "Wisdom". As we heard, "Wisdom" (that is, God) had prepared a great Feast. and God sent out invitations for ALL those who were "simple" to join in this

sacred Meal. In the Scriptures, being "simple" really means being wise enough to know what is really important; it means not foolishly looking for pleasure and satisfaction in all the wrong places. And a "delicious meal" is also a symbol that God uses to remind us that as human beings, we absolutely need food and drink to stay alive physically. So, too, as spiritual beings, we need God's Word and God's Food, to stay alive spiritually.

That's why today's Gospel passage is so important. In today's passage from St. John's Gospel, we heard Jesus make an amazing <u>statement</u>: "I am the living bread come down from Heaven." And then, Jesus makes an even more amazing <u>promise</u>: "Whoever eats this bread will live forever.... Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood....has eternal life....remains in Me and I in him...will have life because of Me....and will live forever." That was pretty hard for some of the people there to accept. St. John tells us that some of the people "grumbled", and eventually went away.

The <u>only</u> way we can understand this powerful statement, and this even more amazing promise, that Jesus makes in giving us the Precious Gift of the Eucharist is through <u>Faith</u>. What Jesus says doesn't' make sense if we only try to use our human reason; however, it makes complete sense when we listen with the ears of Faith and see with the eyes of Faith!

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ, we know that we are human beings----we are sinners----we have weaknesses----we suffer, we fail, we make mistakes. And yes, as human beings, we are mortal----one day, we will die. But, we are human beings who are also spiritual beings. We are human beings made up of a body and a soul, and we are loved by the God of all the Universe. We are precious and special in God's sight. That's why coming together to celebrate Holy Mass is so very important for us to make time for each and every week. Even though there might be lots of other things we could be doing---maybe even important things like working, or relaxing----we always need to make time to come together to celebrate our Faith.

Even more important than keeping our bodies strong and healthy, we need to keep our souls strong and healthy by doing what we're doing here today: coming to hear God's holy Word, and receiving the precious Gift of the Eucharist. That is what will help us to get to Heaven when our lives in this world come to an end. When we are faithful to Christ in this life, He will make sure that He brings us safely Home to Heaven in the life to come.

Right before Holy Communion at every Mass, we admit our weakness when we say: "Lord, I am not worthy for You to enter into my house, but only say the word and my soul will be healed." And the Lord does! He heals us----He forgives us----He feeds us with His own Body and Blood. Why? Because He loves us unconditionally, and wants us to be with Him forever in Heaven.

That's why every Mass is a celebration, a great Fiesta. When we come to Mass, we have the opportunity to thank God for all His blessings, and to show God that we <u>are</u> "simple", but God sees us as truly wise!
