April 17, 2021

We are carefully following the evolution of the pandemic that affects our daily lives. Yesterday afternoon, Mr. Doug Ford announced new measures that considerably limit activities.

Thus, starting Monday April 19, **only 10 people will be allowed to participate in a liturgical celebration.**

This still requires new arrangements on our part.
Obviously, we must respect this norm.

This morning, while celebrating Mass, I personally found comfort in the text of the Gospel of St. John (6:16-21):

¹⁶ When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, ¹⁷ got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. ¹⁸ The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. ¹⁹ When they had rowed about three or four miles,^[d] they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. ²⁰ But he said to them, "It is I;^[e] do not be afraid." ²¹ Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

In the rough sea that surrounds us, we must continue to row courageously.
The Lord remains present through all winds and tides!

As the first reading reminded us of the institution of the first deacons,
let us pray especially today for our own.

On this feast of Saint Kateri Tekakwitha,

let us not forget our First Nations brothers and sisters.

Nomination - Chancellor for the Diocese of Timmins

Mr. Michel Néron, permanent Deacon, has worked for several years as vice-chancellor of the diocese, for which we are all grateful, in particular for his great availability to answer competently the various questions which he regularly receives. Having expressed a desire to reduce some of his activities, we sought to find, in our local resources, someone who could take on the Chancellery file and start preparing for it now.

To this end, I asked Fr. Henri Touaboy .C.S. Sp, currently parish priest of Saint-Joachim of South Porcupine, present in the diocese since 2006 and doctor in theology, to gradually assume this ecclesial service, at the rate of one day per week, without prejudice to his responsibilities as parish priest. Thus, since last August, Fr. Henri has become chancellor of the diocese; he will be present on Tuesdays at the Diocesan Center.

Mr. Néron continues to support him in learning this new mission; he himself remains at the Tribunal for matrimonial causes, as well as master of ceremonies during Episcopal liturgical celebrations.

I thank Fr. Henri and M. Néron for their ecclesial service.

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Bishop of Timmins

Fr. Mitch Sliwa retired his services for the Diocese of Timmins and will be returning in his homeland of Poland when international travelling is safer in reason of the Covid-19 pandemic. Bishop Poitras went to Holy Name Parish and Holy Trinity Parish on August 29 and 30th, to celebrate Fr. Mitch's last masses with him and in the name of the diocese of Timmins, thanked him for his priestly mission and cooperation during his journey with our diocese.

Infifax 69 from Bishop Serge Poitras date March 17, 2020:

COVID-19

On Friday, March 13th, I wrote Infifax N. 68 on some of the local effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, the coronavirus. As our Diocese, at that time, had no cases of this disease and gatherings of 250 people were allowed, I felt that we could have our usual Sunday celebrations.

However, on March 16th, the Chief Public Health Officer of Canada invited Canadians to eliminate gatherings of more than 50 people in order to limit the spread of the new coronavirus; today, March 17th, the Premier of Ontario made this measure mandatory. It seems that we should expect, as for the United States, an even greater reduction in the more or less short term: 10 people!

- 1- **As such, it is no longer be possible for the faithful to go to church for our usual Sunday and even of weekday Masses until April 5 2020.** According to Canon 1248 § 2, *"if participation in the Eucharistic celebration becomes impossible because of the absence of a sacred minister or for another grave cause, it is strongly recommended that the faithfuldevote themselves to prayer for a suitable time alone, as a family"*.

- 2- The priests will, however, continue to celebrate Mass in church, alone or with one or two assistants. Unable to be physically present at these celebrations, the faithful are invited to be spiritually united with their priest at the time they usually go to mass, or according to the new timetable indicated by the priest. It will be the same for daily mass.
- 3- As Catholic faithful, we must live this moment in faith, taking the example of Our Holy Father Pope Francis who went to meditate before the crucifix that saved many from the plague and before the image of the Blessed Virgin protector of the Roman people.
- 4- Masses are broadcast on television and on the internet:

- 6- It is possible to unite spiritually to the Masses celebrated privately in the diocese:

- a. Mass of the Bishop in his chapel, Monday to Friday at 7 a.m. Saturday and Sunday at 9 a.m.
- b. Masses in the parish church: own timetable.

7- How can we spiritually unite with these local Masses?

- a. Turn off the TV or radio.
- b. Take a moment of silence:
 - i. Make the sign of the cross: place oneself in the presence of God;
 - ii. Call to mind your church: altar, tabernacle, crucifix, statue of Mary
 - iii. Remember the face of the priest, regular faithful
- c. Express our faith in the communion of saints: the Blessed Virgin, Saint Joseph, angels, patron saints;
- d. Express our union with the Pope, bishop, parish priest, faithful of the parish, and of the world.
- e. Read the Word of God: *Living with Christ* or Bible
- f. Recite the Rosary : glorious mysteries on Sunday and Wednesday; joyful mysteries (Monday) and Saturday); sorrowful mysteries (Tuesday and Friday); luminous mysteries (Thursday).

Here is an example of the glorious mysteries.

- i. *Resurrection*: pray for the COVID-19 patients and the deceased, families, personal intentions (families, friends)
- ii. *Ascension*: pray for medical personnel and public services (security, food, medication).
- iii. *Pentecost*: asking for light and strength for medical researchers and workers affected by the economic context.
- iv. *Assumption*: pray for those in charge that they make the right decisions for people and society
- v. *Coronation of Mary*: pray for pastors: that they will find the means to spiritually accompany the faithful in this time of crisis.

7- Make the Spiritual Communion like proposed in Infobox n. 68 :

Recite the *I believe in God*, the *Our Father*, the *Hail Mary* 3 times, then the following prayer of Saint Alphonsus Liguori:

My Jesus, I believe that you are in the Blessed Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I long for you in my soul. Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. As though you have already come, I embrace you and unite myself entirely to you; never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

One recites then three times the *Glory to God, to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit*.

Conclusion : *May God Bless us and keep us from every evil and lead us to Eternal Life.*

- 8- The churches will be open at certain times for a private visit to the Blessed Sacrament.
- 9- The priests remain available for the Sacrament of Penance, the Anointing of the Sick and Viaticum.
- 10- All activities of our parishes which bring together several people are suspended (i.e. movements, sacramental preparation, committees).
- 11- For Holy Week:
 - a. The palms will be blessed by the priest and can be taken from the church.
 - b. The Chrism Mass will not take place in New Liskeard as planned, but will be celebrated privately at the cathedral or perhaps even in the Bishop's Chapel.
 - c. Holy Thursday, we will offer moments for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

Sacrament of the Sick

Introduction: In our diocesan Church, this February, we are invited to reflect on the importance of the sacrament of the sick to better deepen our relationship with Christ. The Church is attentive to the sick or weakened. To break the isolation of those who suffer, we are invited to show the compassion of Christ and our fraternal solidarity.

Word of God: James 5, 14-16

*Any one of you who is ill should send for the elders of the church,
and they must anoint the sick person with oil
in the name of the Lord and pray over him.
The prayer of faith will save the sick person
and the Lord will raise him up again;
and if he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven.
So confess your sins to one another,
and pray for one another to be cured;
the heartfelt prayer of someone upright works very powerfully.*

Sharing: A Christian does not only prepare for his/her death, but also for his/her resurrection. We are not just mortal, but eternal, invited to eternal happiness. "Happy are the guests at the wedding feast of the Lamb! » (Rev 19, 9)

What is your experience of the sacrament of the sick:
Have you already received it?
Have you participated in this sacrament with a dear person?
How do I reach out to sick people,
how do I offer them the sacrament of the sick?
What do you think of this sentence: as Christians,
we do not only prepare for death but for resurrection?

Prayer: Luke 2, 29-32

“Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace,
according to your word,
for my eyes have seen your salvation,
which you prepared in sight of all the peoples,

and glory for your people Israel.”

Introduction: Tonight, we are invited to reflect on the meaning

great importance? Personally, how do I enter into a relationship with
Christ through the different sacraments?

Word of God: Jn 20, 30-31

Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of his disciples,
which are not recorded in this book.

But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God,
and that by believing you may have life in his name.

Faith: In the Catholic Church, as in the Orthodox Churches,
there are seven sacraments: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist,
Penance, Sacrament of the Sick, Holy Orders and Marriage.
" The sacraments, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church,
are efficacious signs of grace perceptible to the senses.
Through them divine life is bestowed upon us."

(Compendium 224).

What questions would I like to ask about the meaning of
sacraments for today?

Prayer: May our lives be a reflection of your life, Lord.
We thank you for your Word.
Thank you for your voice that speaks to us in the scriptures.
May your Word turn us into witnesses,

as prophets, men and women of dawn.
Trace for us the paths in the middle of our deserts.
Keep among us the signs of your presence.
Revive in our families and communities
faith in your promises of life,
and in the memory of your faithful love,
send us as far as your Spirit leads us.

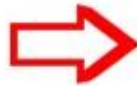

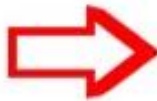

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
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
