From the Pastor's Desk

Dives and Lazarus

The Gospel according to St. Luke has all kinds of parables that are unique to his book and are not found in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, or John. Some of the more famous examples include the Good Samaritan (10:25-37), the Prodigal Son (15:11-32), and the Pharisees and the Publican (18:9-14). One other example is that of the Rich Man and Lazarus (16:19-31) which we will hear proclaimed this weekend.



It focuses on two central figures, that of a poor man named Lazarus and a rich man who is unnamed. Throughout the centuries the rich man has sometimes been referred to by the name of Dives (which would be pronounced more as Dy-vees than as the action which a diver does into a pool of water). As it turns out, Dives is actually the Latin word that would be translated into English as "rich man." This is striking to note since most of secular human history remembers rich and famous people by name and forgets the poor and the lowly.

While there are so many nuances and layers to this particular parable one of the overarching themes that biblical scholars highlight is the idea that God's justice always triumphs. While the proverbial "good guys" or "good gals" may not always experience riches, fame, power, influence, or even health in this life, the Lord takes into account everything that happens here on Earth for every single person. This is not to excuse moral laziness or slothfulness on our part since God will make everything right at the end of time. Quite the opposite!

With the limited time that we are given here we are all called and challenged to love the Lord above all things and to love our neighbor as ourselves. When we see someone who is hungry, thirsty, sick, imprisoned, or suffering in another way we are summoned to show them mercy in the capacity that we are able. May the Lord Jesus, who is rich in mercy, continue to help us to be merciful to others so that we might experience the joys of our Heavenly homeland as Lazarus did.

Called to Compassion

What does a homeless person need? That may seem like an odd question since being homeless would indicate they certainly need a home. Beyond that though, what does a homeless person need? Most would guess the person needs food, money, clothing, medical care, and toiletries. Many parishes put together drives for those items. Is that all the person needs? It is easy to get caught up in all the things that easily come to mind so that we miss a key thing needed by someone homeless as well as all human beings: to be seen.

How many of us pass by homeless people and pretend they are not even there. We don't have money in our pocket, we don't have food to give, and we don't have material items that they need, so we offer them nothing. We don't even offer ourselves.

Welcoming someone with a kind word is free. Amazingly, we act like it costs us more than anything else. It is easier to hand someone \$5 than it is to engage in a 15-second exchange of words. We talk about being generous, but we need to remember that sometimes the greatest gift we have to give is simply ourselves. The Jesus in me meets the Jesus in you. One day, you or I may find ourselves in a tough spot, and we will be looking for compassion. Let's hope that all those who profess to know Jesus don't simply pass on by pretending not to see us.

Why Do We Do That? Catholic Life Explained

Question: I volunteer every once in a while. How can I incorporate serving the poor in my everyday life?

Answer: In the Gospels, Jesus is very clear about emphasizing outreach to vulnerable persons on the margins of society. These may be the materially poor, the disabled, the lonely, or any others whose circumstances drive them from mainstream society. We can all respond to Christ's call to love by incorporating direct service into our regular life routine. Here are some ideas to find your niche:

- Consider your life. Before you look for direct service opportunities, consider your schedule, commitment levels, and personal gifts. When can you help out and how regularly? Where have you volunteered in the past that has felt like a good fit? Do you have any particular skills or personality traits that lend you to particular work?
- **Do some research.** There are a lot of structured ways you can get involved in your community. Your parish might have a social concerns outreach program. If not, ask friends and family. A simple online search for local nonprofits can also expose you to new opportunities.
- Be open to God's invitation. The chance to serve may be closer than you think. Befriending an elderly neighbor, widowed and far from children, is an act of serving the poor. Keep your eyes and heart open!

Live the Liturgy—Inspiration for the Week

People often think that if they witness something miraculous, it would bring them to a greater faith and motivate them for greater involvement. Such is not necessarily true, as coming to a real and authentic faith still requires that we struggle with ourselves a bit and change our approach to living. Authentic faith is acquired when we see wisdom and life in the words of the prophets and in the teachings of Jesus Christ. All of these point us to a God who has a particular set of priorities for how life is meant to be lived. We have to avoid the trap of complacency that is rooted in preserving our own self-interests and living lives that pursue "righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness." (1 TM 6: 11) Complacency keeps us stuck in the status quo and prevents us from working toward respect for life, equality, and justice, and from advocating on behalf of the needs of the poor, the homeless, and the alien. Gospel Meditation

Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time



If you saw someone dead come to life tomorrow, what would you change about your life? Would you say "nothing"? That's what Jesus seems to hope. After all, we already know what to do. In this Sunday's Gospel, a rich man and a poor man pass away, the former to damnation and the latter to peaceful

rest alongside the Jewish patriarchs. The rich man asks if the poor man can appear to his brothers and advise them to live a more virtuous life. The parable offers a strong rebuke: "They have Moses and the prophets. Let them listen to them." In other words, they should already know what to do.

We, too, know what to do. More than Moses, Jesus Christ himself has spoken, and continues to speak through his Church. The rich man did not heed the wise words, despite knowing them. If we are convicted against certain Christian teachings in our heart, how much good will miraculous "proofs" do? We know more than the law and the prophets—we know the prophetic law of love proclaimed by Jesus Christ. Are we living like we believe it?

Where in our lives are we like the rich man? Do we know how to treat the poor but still we ignore them in our excess? Do we know the third commandment, but the Sunday liturgy feels "optional" when other weekend commitments arise? Have we heard Christ's teachings on sexuality, but consider them out of reach for us? We have received a great many truths as Christian people. We are blessed by God with the sacraments and the abundance of His graces. We have what we need—in Him — to begin to live a virtuous life *now*.



The Gift of Our Guardian Angels

It's good to know we're not alone. This October 2nd we celebrate the feast of our guardian angels. This ancient belief has roots in Scripture. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus implies the special guiding care of the angels. "See that you do not despise one of

these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father" (Matthew 18:10). Our guardian angels are given to us by God to protect and watch over us from the moment of our conception until the hour of death. Let's pray together to our own heavenly help: Angel of God, my guardian dear, to whom God's love commits me here, ever this day be at my side to light, to guard, to rule, and to guide. Amen.
