

# From the Pastor's Desk

## The Arms of Moses

There is a song from the early 1970s called "Lean on Me" that has been recorded and re-recorded by various musical artists. It was originally written and performed by Bill Withers and the overarching theme of the catchy tune is that of caring for a friend in need. The main refrain hammers home this point when it states, "Lean on me, when you're not strong and I'll be your friend. I'll help you carry on. For it won't be long 'til I'm gonna need somebody to lean on." Of course, this idea of having someone to lean upon for support goes even further back than the 20th century.



Our first reading at Mass on Sunday from the Book of Exodus has a setting some 1500 years before the birth of Christ. Within that passage we read that there was an intense battle between the Israelites and a fearsome group of warriors known as the Amalekites. Moses went up on a hill and watched the battle unfold before him. Out of prayerful solidarity for the Israelites he raised his arms up with the same staff that he had used when parting the Red Sea. When he did so the Israelites had the proverbial upper hand in the fight. However, he eventually grew weary and had to sit down.

As his arms drooped so too did the Israelites drop off in their military success. Seeing this, Moses' brother Aaron came over to him with a fellow named Hur to support their friend in his time of need. They came to his help, "one on one side and one on the other, so that his hands remained steady till sunset" (Exodus 17:12). Moses was able to lean on his brother Aaron and Hur when he wasn't strong. In your moments of weakness who can you depend upon to support you? Good Lord willing, you've got family members or friends who can be there for you.

All of us can run to our truest friend, Jesus Christ, who also raised his arms up so that we might have victory in our lives; not necessarily over the Amalekites but over sin and despair and even death itself. May that be our source of strength and a word of encouragement so that we can continue to carry on for the Glory of the Lord.



## Parish Council All Committee Meeting Report

In mid September, the Parish Council hosted its first “All-Committee meeting.” If proven to be valuable to attendees, additional All-Committee meetings will be held in the future. Please feel free to provide me with feedback if you attended the meeting.

The purpose of an All-Committee meeting is to provide an opportunity for representatives from each IC committee or ministry to present a brief update on what their committee has been doing to further their mission. Each representative gave a brief report on one or two memorable things from the past year, followed by its vision for the next year. This format fosters camaraderie among parishioners and an increased awareness of all the service being performed throughout the church. Personally, I found it energizing to learn of all the ways we work together to fulfill our mission “as Christian disciples by intentionally responding to God’s call to grow in holiness.”

Here are some highlights from the reports:

- Discipleship Committee is charged with growing a culture of discipleship at Immaculate Conception. Their plan for the next year is to increase participation with other committees
- Council of Catholic Women (CCW) hosted their annual retreat during Lent, organized fundraisers to support their many ministries, serve funeral lunches, among other things
- Liturgy Committee reported that the pipe organ restoration is fully funded and will be completed soon
- School Advisory Council announced that current enrollment is at 185, up from 168 last year. The Queen of May event raised a record \$110,000!
- Finance Council reported that a primary goal is to build our reserve funds over the next year
- Knights of Columbus are increasing recruitment efforts to attract new members. They host monthly pancake breakfasts to raise money for seminarian scholarships and to support our local nuns
- Faith Formation is experiencing an increase in requests for new sacraments. This is in part to the growth in the Immaculate Conception Spanish Community
- Charismatic Prayer Group hosted a Life in the Spirit Seminar that was attended by over 100 people some of whom travelled from as far away as Duluth and Rochester
- Intercessory Prayer Group started in 2016 at the request of Fr. John Mitchell. The group prays for the needs of the church
- Our Lady of Guadalupe are planning to host an all community retreat in Spring of 2020 to celebrate the first anniversary of the Spanish Mass
- Social Justice focuses on both works of charity (sock drive, Catholic Charities Opportunity Center meal service, Giving Tree) and social justice (coordinating a day of prayer outside of Planned Parenthood in St. Paul)
- Arts and Environment created a new ordinary time banner which took over 200 hours to complete

The first All-Committee meeting appeared to be a success. It was a unifying experience. It brought together many little pockets of enthusiasm in one room sharing our excitement to carry out the mission of Immaculate Conception. Thank you for making Immaculate Conception a great place to worship!



## Why Do We Do That? - Catholic Life Explained

**Question:** *God rarely seems to answer my prayers. Is He really listening?*

**Answer:** Throughout Scripture, God promises to answer the prayers of His people. Sometimes things don’t turn out the way we’d hope. God won’t miraculously do evil or fulfill selfish intentions. If we’re praying for something immoral, God isn’t going to answer that prayer for us! Of course, we still have the freedom to make choices, but it isn’t God’s movement. Sometimes we’re not praying for something evil, but our intentions are less than honorable. For example, “Please convert my mother-in-law so she goes to church more and visits us less!” While God is no doubt at work in the woman’s life, He likely won’t answer that prayer in the way you’d expect!

After all, God knows what He is about. He has plans in mind for us, but they might not be what we think. For most of us, winning the lottery would bring about a material benefit. That said, funds used in continually purchasing tickets to provide the means for God to “work” could likely go towards better avenues of financial stability. God is concerned with our ultimate good. When we pray, we’re invited to surrender our lives to Him. One of the first petitions in the Our Father is “*Thy will be done.*” Sometimes the lack of an answer *is* an answer! Are we prepared to receive it?

# Gospel Meditation

## Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time



“Render a just decision for me against my adversary.” Today’s Gospel features a persistent widow who ekes out justice from a notoriously cold-hearted judge. Why does she win the day? “Because the widow keeps bothering me.” Jesus’ recommendation to the disciples is to be persistent in prayer,

because surely God the Father is far more attuned to their needs than this judge. If only it were that easy, right? We’ve all experienced the unanswered prayer, the silence after our cries. When this continues, sometimes it can be difficult to have faith in God or believe He answers prayers. It can be easy to lapse into a sense of His distance. We want Him to do something “fair,” which—in our limited view—typically means that something works out in our favor.

There are, of course, many legitimate cries for justice. We live in a fallen world filled with flawed human beings. We hurt each other, sometimes grievously, and our efforts to remake the world in our image can result in unjust, inhumane systems. Faced with the problem of evil, we may wonder how God will “secure the rights of his chosen ones.” Sometimes, He may well seem “slow to answer them.”

In the face of these very real questions, it’s important to recall the words of the prophet Isaiah, that God’s thoughts “are not [our] thoughts.” His ways are not our ways. God respects the freedom He has given us. When we see what free will has wrought, perhaps we question God’s better judgment! Yet somehow, we hear that He mysteriously works all things for our good. No matter what situation we find ourselves in, we are always free to love. We are invited to be persistent in our prayer, to continue bringing our concerns before God in trusting surrender. We are invited to love well in the circumstances we find ourselves in, to be a light in the darkness. No matter when—or if—our prayers are answered the way we would like, we are nonetheless invited to witness to “faith on earth.”
