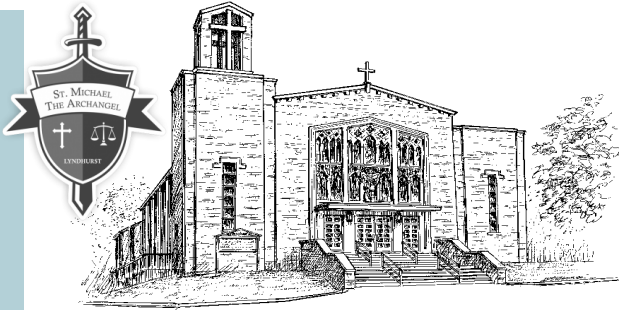

For the week of March 28th, the Tabernacle Candles were given in loving memory of Theresa & James Tomney from Kathy Tomney.

Throughout the season of Lent, you have prayed, fasted and performed works of charity. Perhaps you did not keep all of your Lenten resolutions, but now Lent is ending. We turn our gaze from the Forty Days, that marathon of discipline, to The Three Days.

TRIDUUM

The Three Days are Friday, Saturday and Sunday, but we start counting on Thursday night, the night before the first day. Each of the days begins the night before, as the most important liturgical feasts do. Clear your calendar for the Three Days!

Gather at Church with the faithful who will participate in this First Triduum liturgy. Sing the Glory to God, that beautiful prayer from which the church has abstained during Lent.

HOLY THURSDAY

No morning and noon masses

7:00pm: Concelebrated Mass of the Lord’s Supper followed by adoration until 11:00pm.

GOOD FRIDAY

We call this Friday “good”. There is nothing good in what humanity did. There is everything good in what Jesus did. Spend this day as you would spend a day absorbed in thoughts of a loved one. Eat less. Do less. The primary liturgy today is the Celebration of the Lord’s Passion. It is not a Mass.

A day of strict fast and abstinence. Church opens at 9:00am.

3:00pm: Liturgy of the Passion and Death of our Lord .

7:00pm: Liturgy of the Passion and Death of our Lord (in Polish)

Vigil at the Tomb after the 3 pm Liturgy until 6:45 pm and then after the 7 pm Polish language Liturgy until 11 pm. The church will reopen at 9 am on Saturday.

HOLY SATURDAY

Church opens at 9:00am.

Blessing of Easter Food (Swieconka) will take place in Church at 10 am, 12 noon and 2 pm.

Vigil at the Tomb will continue until 6 pm.

THE EASTER VIGIL

The most important liturgy of the year is the Easter Vigil. No other event has more significance than this celebration. You must participate: You simply must be there. The church needs you.

8:30pm— The Easter Vigil Mass -

The blessing of the new fire, the lighting of the paschal candle, the Proclamation of Easter, the Easter readings, Blessing of the baptismal waters, the Proclamation of the Alleluia and Liturgy of The Eucharist will take place in church.

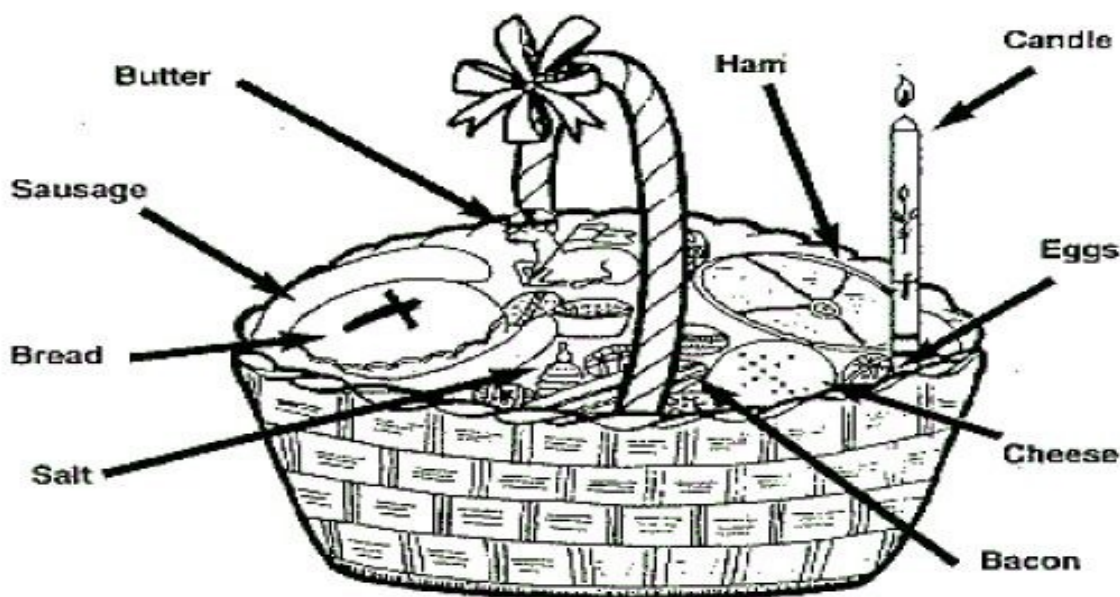
Blessing of Easter Food Baskets at St. Michael the Archangel Holy Saturday – April 3rd 10am, 12 noon and 2:00pm

The Origin of the Easter Basket

The use of Easter baskets developed from the more modern symbolism of Christianity. Christians celebrate Easter because it signifies Christ's resurrection. During Lent, which lasts for 40 days before Easter, many Christians abstain from certain foods or treats until Easter comes. The tradition of feasting on a large Easter meal symbolizes the end of Lenten fasting. In earlier times, this Easter feast was brought in large baskets to church to be blessed by priests, in much the same way as ancient cultures brought their first seedlings to be blessed in temples.

A Traditional Easter Basket

Large baskets are filled with symbolic ingredients to be used / shared by all at the family's Easter meal.



BUTTER – symbolizing Christ's reminder to us of the good will we should have towards all things. The butter is traditionally shaped into a lamb or cross. Variations, whipped butter, sometimes with garlic and herbs added.

BREAD – the heart of the basket is a loaf of bread. This symbolizes Jesus, who is the "Bread of Life". It can be rolls, rye bread, challah or something you bake yourself.

HORSERADISH – this bitter, strong tasting root reminds us of the Passion of Christ.

SALT - an essential mineral we cannot live without, salt symbolizes prosperity and justice, and reminds us that we are to be "the salt of the earth". Perhaps a small bottle of sea salt/table salt.

CHEESE – a symbol of moderation Christians should have at all times. All different flavors: Brie, herbed cheeses etc.

EGGS – symbolize Christ’s resurrection and new life. Hard boiled, white or colored decorated with symbols of Easter/life.

THERE ARE A NUMBER OF MEATS THAT CAN BE ADDED TO YOUR EASTER BASKET:

SAUSAGE – This symbolizes God’s favor and generosity. Choose a sausage product you enjoy.

HAM, LAMB OR VEAL – symbolic of great joy and abundance. The lamb also reminds Christians that the Risen Christ is the “Lamb of God”.

SMOKED BACON, PROSCIUTTO – a symbol of the overabundance of God’s generosity and mercy.

OLIVES, OLIVE OIL – stuffed, flavored etc. The olive tree symbolizes wisdom, peace, hope, light, wealth and balance.

WINE – wine has always played a large role in Biblical life, so it is appropriate to include a small bottle.

CANDLE – symbolizing Christ as the Light of the World, this can be a plain, white taper.

COLORFUL RIBBONS & SPRIGS OF GREENERY – are attached to the basket as signs of joy and new life in the season of spring and in celebration of the Resurrection.

A LINEN COVER – once the basket is assembled, it is covered with a fine cloth, crocheted doily or an embroidered napkin, which is then ready for the trip to church where it is joined with the baskets of others to await blessing. Once blessed, the food is enjoyed during the family’s Easter meal.
