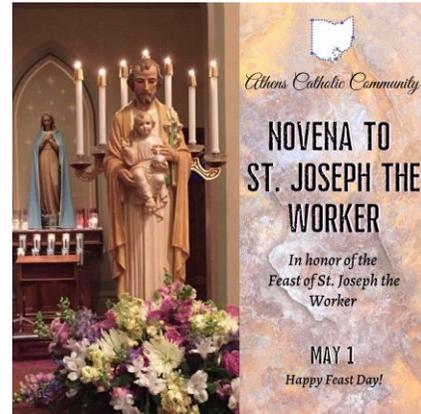

Ohio Bishops extend suspension of public Masses

The Bishops of Ohio have extended the suspension (and dispensation) of publicly celebrated Masses until May 24. Currently, the Bishops are working out ideas for ways to re-open Masses. Bishop Monforton announced on Wednesday, April 29 that he has started a task force of clergy and lay representatives to determine how this can best be accomplished in our diocese. The month of May is dedicated to Mary.

For centuries, the Catholic Church has set aside the entire month of May to honor Mary, Mother of God. The roots of this may lie in the ancient Roman custom of dedicating the month of May to Flora, the goddess of blooms, or blossoms. They celebrated *ludi florals*, or floral games, at the end of April and asked the intercession of Flora for all that blooms. In medieval times, similar customs abounded, all centering around the practice of expelling winter, as May 1 was considered the start of new growth.

It was in the baroque era that Mary's Month and May were combined, making May the Month of Mary with special devotions organized throughout the month. This custom became especially widespread during the nineteenth century and remains in practice today.

Even though we will not meet physically for most of this month, we hope that you can still honor Mary in your own special way. Here are some ideas:

- Consider putting up a Marian image in your home, in your work space, or as your phone background for the month.
- If you have a statue of Mary in your home or garden, you can have your own May crowning this weekend.
