In case you missed it, this is an election year in the USA....

Our Diocesan Public Policy Committee has developed resources for individuals and parishes to use to promote what our US Catholic Bishops call **Faithful Citizenship**. We are called to form our consciences before we fill out our ballots. Voting shouldn't be simply about protecting our own finances and self-interest. Like everything else we do, we should vote in the light of Christ's teaching and to advance The Common Good—the interests of all.

For all citizens of the United States, that our participation in the upcoming election may lead to a world of greater respect for life and commitment to justice and peace, we pray to the Lord


