## REFLECTION



### *Levels of Receptivity of the Word of God*

The readings for this Sunday call us to a kind of self-examination. The Gospel describes various levels of receptivity. Today we are challenged to look into our own lives in order to discover how receptive we are.

Receptivity is the willingness to allow ourselves to receive from another, to be influenced by that other, perhaps to be transformed. Receptivity came very naturally to us when we were children. We instinctively knew we were needy. As we grew and matured, we became more and more independent and self-directed and less inclined to be influenced by others. This situation is natural, but it does have its drawbacks. The more independent we are, the less likely it is we will be open to others and, consequently, less receptive to their ideas.

By definition disciples are receptive to the one they are following. Because of the independence into which so many of us have grown we can experience a major problem here. To be a disciple of Jesus requires receptivity, so it is important that we scrutinize ourselves to discover the extent to which we are open.

At issue is not the character of the seed but the disposition of the soil. It makes little difference who sows the seed. God works through both the well-recognized and the most unlikely of sowers. Is our openness superficial, like the rocky ground? It is fickle, like the thorny ground? Or are we really receptive to the Word of God, like the ground that produces? And finally, are we as productive as we might be?

## LOOKING AHEAD

### *From the 15<sup>th</sup> to the 17<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time*

In the Gospel of Matthew, the “Discourse in Parables” constitutes a well-defined unit. “On that day, Jesus went out of the house and sat down by the sea. Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into the boat and sat down, and the whole crowd stood along the shore. And he spoke to them at length in parables.” Thus, begins chapter 13. And at the end, Jesus asks, “Do you understand all these things?” It is rare enough to find in biblical books a whole so clearly recognizable as a unit. This chapter is read in its entirety on the Fifteenth, Sixteenth and Seventeenth Sundays in Ordinary Time, Year A; therefore, we see an obvious sequence in this succession of Sunday liturgies.

My word will not return void  
Psalm – Psalm 65:10-14  
God has watered the land  
2<sup>nd</sup> Reading – Romans 8:18-23  
Creation awaits with eager expectation  
Gospel – Matthew 13:1-23  
A sower went out to sow

### **Sixteenth Sunday:**

1<sup>st</sup> Reading – Wisdom 12:13, 16-19  
God’s might is the source of justice  
Psalm – Psalm 86:5-6, 9-10, 15-16  
Lord, you are good and forgiving  
2<sup>nd</sup> Reading – Romans 8:26-27  
The Spirit intercedes with us  
Gospel – Matthew 13:24-43  
Let them grow together

### **Seventeenth Sunday:**

1<sup>st</sup> Reading – 1 Kings 3:5, 7-12  
An understanding heart  
Psalm – Psalm 119: 57, 72, 76-77, 127-128, 129-130  
Lord, I love your law  
2<sup>nd</sup> Reading – Romans 8:28-30  
Conformed to the image of Jesus
