REFLECTION

Merit or Grace?

The parable of the Vineyard, during Jesus' ministry, represented Jesus' response to those who accused him of wasting his time and efforts among the least members of society. No doubt the Scribes and Pharisees regarded themselves as full-time, dawn-to-dusk workers whom God would generously reward at the end of their day. These righteous ones were certain that those who strayed from God's ways could never merit the same reward. But, Jesus in whom the ways and thoughts of God became incarnate, reached out with mercy and generous forgiveness for all, not as merit that can be earned but as grace freely given to sinners.

Most of us would bristle at what appears to be an injustice perpetuated on hard-working people. The parable however teaches us a lesson about the Kingdom of Heaven. Entrance to the Kingdom cannot be earned, no matter how early one rises or how long one works. Entrance is God's gift, given freely and mercifully to those who seem by human standards to deserve it, as well as to those who do not. Generous mercy is that quality of God without which we would have no hope of survival.
