REFLECTION

**Isaiah 53:10-11 Psalm 33 Hebrews 4:14-16
Mark 10:35-45**

As Jesus Did

James and John come up with a classic misunderstanding of the Christian way of life. "Grant that in your glory we may sit one on your right and the other on your left." Completely ignoring Jesus' words about suffering and death, they fear their importance will be overlooked when Jesus is finally recognized and accepted as the glorious Messiah most Jews were expecting. "Can you drink the cup that I drink, or be Baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" Early Christian baptism was always administered by immersion. Being submerged in water conveyed one's commitment to die with Jesus; coming up from the water, was one's belief in one's resurrection. The heart of Christian faith lies in Jesus' explanation of what it means to die with him. For Jesus, it is to be completely open to whatever God asks of us. Secondly, it is to accept even the most insignificant people on an equal footing with everyone else. Thirdly, it is to look at our entire lives and our purpose for being on this earth. By referring to himself as "a ransom for many", Jesus is saying he finds his value in the value of those he serves. If Jesus is important, it's only because he serves important people. Nothing could be more revolutionary!

World Mission Sunday

This day is designated to offer prayer and financial support for missionaries around the world. It is also a day to remember that the Church is missionary at its very core. All the baptized are called to carry on the mission of Christ and to proclaim the good news to the world. *Be generous.*

LITURGICAL ORIENTATION

29th – 30th Sundays in Ordinary Time

In the Gospel according to Mark, Jesus makes three predictions of his passion as he goes on his march to Jerusalem. In the gospel readings of the 29th and 30th Sundays in Ordinary Time, we are with Jesus and his disciples in the last phase of his journey to the city of Jerusalem. Jesus has just finished telling the Twelve what is in store for him at the end of the journey; arrest, insults, condemnation to death, and three days later – Resurrection. The disciples are following, but they are terrified. James and John, who have their minds on other things, believe that Jesus is announcing the beginning of an earthly Kingdom that has messianic dreams. As a consequence, they approached Jesus to ask that they be closely associated with his glory, in the first two places nearest him. Obviously, they have not understood anything. Jesus then moves to open the eyes of his blind disciples (29th Sunday).

Immediately afterward, the gospel reports that at that moment Jesus *was leaving Jericho with his disciples and a sizable crowd, Bartimaeus, a blind man, the son of Timaeus, ... began to cry out and say, Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me.* Moved by this man's faith, Jesus summons him and grants him what he asks: his sight. The man begins to follow Jesus on the road to Jerusalem (30th Sunday). In these two stories we learn that it is the light of faith alone that allows us to see the true meaning of following Jesus.
