

To the Parishioners of St. Mary the Virgin

We will be celebrating All Saints Day on Friday, Nov. 1 with two Masses at St. Mary the Virgin, a said Mass at 9 a.m. and a solemn Mass at 7 p.m. This Holy Day of Obligation allows us in a particular way to give thanks for the witness of godly men and women who show us how to perfect and persevere in our faith.

Here at St. Mary we are blessed to have the relics of 18 saints and the true cross now available for veneration in one of our side altars. On their feast day, the relic of the saint is brought to the altar for Mass. Here is brief overview of our saints and their feast days.

Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774 –1821) Feast Day January 4: Wife, mother and founder of the Sisters of Charity in the U.S. after her husband’s death. A convert to the faith from the Episcopal Church, she was the first American-born saint to be canonized.

Saint Francis de Sales – (1567-1622) Feast Day January 24: Bishop, writer and Doctor of the Church, who founded the Order of the Visitation and is known for his book, *Introduction to the Devout Life*.

Saint Thomas Aquinas – (1225-1274) Feast Day January 28: Dominican priest and Doctor of the Church. His greatest work is the *Summa Theologica*.

Saint Scholastica – (480-543) Feast Day February 10: Nun, founder of a convent and twin sister of Saint Benedict.

Saint Anselm – (1033-1109) April 21 (Deposited in the Altar): Archbishop of Canterbury, Doctor of the Church and known as the father of scholasticism.

Saint Catherine of Siena – (1347-1380) Feast Day April 29: Third order Dominican, mystic and Doctor of the Church, who had a major influence on the return of the papacy to Rome.

Saint Benedict – (480-547) Feast Day July 11: Abbot and founder of Western monasticism.

Saint Charbal Mahklouf (1828-1898) – Feast Day July 24: Maronite priest, who is credited with hundreds of miracles.

Saint Dominic – (1170-1221) Feast Day August 8: Priest, founder of the Dominican order of preachers.

Saint Jane Frances de Chantal (1572-1641) – Feast Day August 12: Wife, mother and founder of the Order of the Visitation with Saint Francis de Sales after becoming a widow.

Saint Rose of Lima – (1586-1617) Feast Day August 23: Third order Dominican known for the care the sick and poor.

Saint Vincent de Paul – (1580-1660) Feast Day September 27: Priest and founder of the Congregation of the Mission and the Daughters of Charity.

Saint Therese of Lisieux – (1873-1 897) Feast Day October 1: Carmelite nun and Doctor of the Church known for her autobiography *The Story of a Soul*.

Saint Teresa of Avila – (1515-1582) Feast Day October 15: Nun, Doctor of the Church and founder of the Discalced Carmelites.

Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque – (1647-1690) Feast Day October 16: Visitation nun whose visions of Christ promoted the Sacred Heart of Jesus devotion.

Saint Peter of Alcantara – (1499-1562) Feast Day October 18: Franciscan priest and mystic, who aided St. Teresa of Avila.

Saint Catherine Laboure – (1806- 1876) Feast Day November 28: Sister of Charity whose visions provided the design for the miraculous medal.

Saint John of the Cross – (1542-1591) Feast Day December 14: Carmelite priest and Doctor of the Church known for his *Dark Night of the Soul*.

New Class Explores Christian Suffering

Catholic women of the parish are invited to sign up now to participate in a new ENDOW (Educating on the Nature and Dignity of Women) class to study Saint Pope John Paul II's apostolic letter *Salvifici Doloris -- On the Christian Meaning of Suffering*. The eight-week course costs \$15 and will begin on Nov. 17.

The class will meet in the parish offices from 9:15 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. on Sundays and will follow the Christian education schedule. Previous participation in an ENDOW class is not required.

The course invites women to explore why God allows suffering and how to understand suffering as a mean of sanctification. As Saint John Paul II writes:

At my first defense no one took my part; all deserted me. May it not be charged against them! But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength to proclaim the word fully, that all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory for ever and ever. Amen

Luke 18:9-14

News and Notes

The Ordinariate of the Chair of St. Peter Jubilee Begins November 3rd

Bishop Steven Lopes, our Bishop of the Ordinariate is inaugurating a Jubilee year beginning this coming Sunday November 3, and will continue until the Patronal Feast of Our Lady of Walsingham, September 27, 2020. This is to honor of the Tenth Anniversary of the promulgation of the Apostolic Constitution *Anglicanorum coetibus*, the founding document of the three Ordinariates around the globe.

A biblical understanding of Jubilee is intimately tied to an experience of God's mercy. The Holy Father has granted a Plenary Indulgence for the celebration of our anniversary. The Plenary Indulgence can be obtained in two ways:

- ♦ For all who participate in Mass and the singing of the solemn *Te Deum* in an Ordinariate parish on November 3, 2019. St. Mary the Virgin will sing our *Te Deum* at the end of the 10:30 a.m. Mass.
- ♦ For any member of the faithful who makes a pilgrimage visit to the Cathedral and Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham in Houston, Texas, between Nov. 3 2019, and Sept. 27, 2020.

An Indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed, gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church, which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority, the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints (CCC 1471).

The Indulgence for a visit to the Shrine during the Jubilee year may be obtained daily for one's self, or, as an act of supreme charity, the person making the pious visit may receive the Indulgence on behalf of a member of Christ's faithful who has died. The conditions for obtaining the Plenary Indulgence, both on November 3 or by making a pious visit to the Cathedral and Shrine during the Jubilee year are that the faithful Christian:

- ♦ have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin;
- ♦ have sacramentally confessed his/her sins within 20 days of receiving the Indulgence;
- ♦ receive the Holy Eucharist, preferably on the day receiving the Indulgence;
- ♦ pray for the *intentions* of the Supreme Pontiff.
