

Dear St. Dennis Parishioners,

The celebration of a person's life should reflect our conviction that in Jesus Christ and His Church, we have eternal life beyond earthly life. At St. Dennis Parish, we are blessed to have our staff and Raphael ministry to assist in planning the funeral liturgy for your loved one. Experiencing the loss of a loved one, can be extremely difficult. Our loving Triune God, with the assistance of the Church, is here to provide consolation for the living and grace-filled assistance for the deceased. The Mass of Christian Burial is celebrated in the parish church, in the presence of the Christian community of faith. We realize that family members of the deceased are more or less comfortable with the planning and participation of liturgies, especially during such a difficult time. Please feel free to do as much or as little according to your personal comfort level when planning for a funeral Mass. As a faith community, we are here to pray for you and your loved ones as we provide comfort, consolation, and assistance.


**At St. Dennis, we are establishing a new policy regarding eulogies. After Memorial Day, beginning on Tuesday, June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021, there will be NO EULOGIES given at the Mass of Christian Burial in the church. This change will help draw us into the mystery of God's consoling love by fully embracing the beauty of the funeral liturgy that the church provides. Eulogies can be given at the Vigil (Wake) Service during the Visitation at the Funeral Home, Interment at the Cemetery, or at the Funeral Luncheon, but not at the Mass of Christian Burial in church.**

It is important to note that the practice of eulogies at Catholic funerals is optional in the *Order of Christian Funerals*, the official ritual by the Church. Thus, the policy by our diocese is that eulogies during the funeral Mass is left up to the discretion of the Pastor. A eulogy is an elongated narration of the human achievements and qualities of the deceased person. Certainly, homilies should have a personal quality, and the homilist has to connect the readings to the life and death of the deceased. The primary emphasis is always, however, on the readings and the symbols of the funeral rite, and most of all, on the death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is the Paschal mystery that anchors our hope that your loved one is in heaven. The purpose of the funeral Mass is not to celebrate the life of the deceased but to offer worship to God for Christ's victory over death, to comfort the mourners with prayers, and to pray for the soul of the deceased. Too often, comments, stories, and jokes included in eulogies are inappropriate for church. Sometimes things can be said that are offensive and obtuse, and even though good intentioned, eulogies can be misinterpreted due to each person's level of comfort and sensitivity, especially those who are grieving. Relatives or friends who wish to speak of the deceased's character and accomplishments can do so at the Vigil (wake) service at the funeral home, at the graveside following the rite of committal, or at the luncheon.

Finally, we want to show solidarity with our local funeral homes and churches that discourage eulogies at the funeral Mass as well. Many of our local churches do not allow eulogies during the funeral Mass. This new policy allows us to be considerate as we partner with our funeral homes. Some of the cemeteries have strict burial times that are arranged in advance with the church and the funeral director. Eulogies can greatly delay the process upon arrival at the cemetery, and in some cases, disrupt the scheduling entirely of other burials at the cemetery.

We thank you for your understanding as we implement this change. Our hope and prayer is that our funeral liturgies at St. Dennis are meant to provide comfort and healing by Christ and His Church, through the death and Resurrection of Jesus as we pray for your loved one. We do our best to make sure our liturgies are prayerful and reverent as we worship together and seek first the kingdom of heaven. On behalf of the staff and parishioners of St. Dennis Parish, may the peace and consolation of Jesus be yours.
