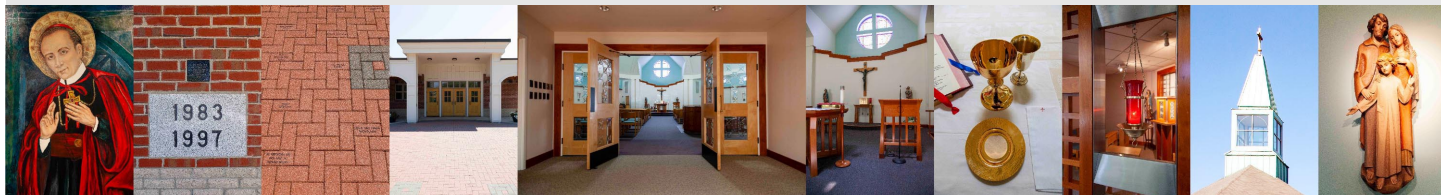

ON CONVERSION

"Do not persist in your unbelief, but believe!" —John 20:27

The conversion of Blessed Charles Foucauld (d. 1916)—one of the most remarkable French priests of the last century—is recounted below. It dates to 1886 when he set out to talk with Father Henri Huvelin. Fr. Huvelin had proved himself a brilliant student and academic. He seemed destined for high office in the Church, but he chose instead the simple life of a parish priest. He was first assigned to Saint-Eugène's, then from 1875 at Saint Augustin's, where he soon became a force in the confessional and in the pulpit. He had the gift of discernment. One of his more noticeable successes was the conversion of the notorious atheist, Littré, on his deathbed. And he was instrumental in the conversion of a young Charles de Foucauld who would be martyred in North Africa in 1916, a heroic witness to Christian charity, and be beatified by Pope Benedict XVI on Nov 13, 2005.

ON October 30, 1886, Charles de Foucauld rose early. He ate no breakfast. His mind aflame, he left his apartment and headed for Saint-Augustin's. A decision had been made. He would meet Father Huvelin. Marie [Marie de Bondy, a close friend and committed Catholic] had advised him to do so, but she mentioned it to no one, since no actual appointment had been made. Charles hoped to see him after one of his lectures. But the priest had recently stopped delivering them, worn out by a nearly fatal attack of bronchitis. Charles then decided to see him anonymously in his confessional, where he could be found before the first Mass.



Since it was very early and the church had just opened, there was as yet no one in the confessional, in the nave's third chapel, on the right. Father Huvelin was there. Charles leaned toward him and, without kneeling, murmured in a voice overcome by emotion: "Father, do not be surprised. I do not come for confession. I do not have the faith. I only wish to learn some things about the Catholic religion."

Father Huvelin fixed his eyes on him: "You do not have the faith. Have you never believed, then?"

"Yes, thirteen years ago. But right now, I am unable to believe. There are all the obstacles of the mysteries, the dogma, the miracles."

"You are mistaken, my son. What is missing now, in order for you to believe, is a pure heart. Go down on your knees, make your confession to God, and you will believe."

"But I have not come for that!"

"That does not matter. Go down on your knees and say the *Confiteor*."

Without really understanding what was happening to him, Charles knelt and confessed at length, covering his entire life. When he would pause, a gentle silence extended over all things, barely disturbed by the soft rustlings of the pious folk gathering in the adjacent chapel to hear early Mass. Finally, the priest granted him absolution: "Deinde te absolvo...."

Charles was filled with joy and a peace he had never thought possible.

"Have you eaten anything?" the priest asked.

"No."

"Receive Communion."

Charles rose to his feet. He felt astonishingly light and at the same time possessed by that incomprehensible joy. In one moment, all his doubts had been swept away. He did not believe, he knew! He headed toward the altar of the Virgin. "*Introibo ad altare Dei*." I shall approach the altar of God. It was as if he had become a child again, the child he had been before the death of his parents. He had found his father again. Then he received the Body of Christ; he would never again be hungry or thirsty.

Yes, astonishing, this conversion. Nothing human involved; it proceeded from the supernatural. Thus Huvelin the theologian stayed in the background. He did not try to convince this very special penitent through arguments addressed to his intelligence. Only God can convert, and he does so by going for the heart. Father Huvelin would give the key to this conversion later in introducing Charles to the abbot of Solesmes: "He makes of religion his love." Father Huvelin saw what others had not seen, even Inès, even Marie, more persuasive in her silences than in the words she must not have failed to address to him in her efforts to convert. He had no need for reasoning, because he had already applied reason to the whole matter. "He needed only one word to catalyze an experience that had reached its culmination." "Make your confession", that is, relinquish yourself, your ego, your pride. "Receive Communion", agree to receive the

One who is Love, by giving yourself to him in return.

"As soon as I came to believe there was a God, I understood that I could not do otherwise than live only for him."

The Catechism speaks of two conversions. The first, of renouncing sin, professing faith in Jesus Christ, and accepting baptism. The second, the uninterrupted task of purification and sanctification:

1427 Jesus calls to CONVERSION. This call is an essential part of the proclamation of the kingdom: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent, and believe in the gospel." In the Church's preaching this call is addressed first to those who do not yet know Christ and his Gospel. Also, Baptism is the principal place for the first and fundamental CONVERSION. It is by faith in the Gospel and by Baptism that one renounces evil and gains salvation, that is, the forgiveness of all sins and the gift of new life.

1428 Christ's call to CONVERSION continues to resound in the lives of Christians. This second CONVERSION is an uninterrupted task for the whole Church who, "clasping sinners to her bosom, [is] at once holy and always in need of purification, [and] follows constantly the path of penance and renewal." This endeavor of CONVERSION is not just a human work. It is the movement of a "contrite heart," drawn and moved by grace to respond to the merciful love of God who loved us first.

1429 St Peter's CONVERSION after he had denied his master three times bears witness to this. Jesus' look of infinite mercy drew tears of repentance from Peter and, after the Lord's resurrection, a threefold affirmation of love for him. The second CONVERSION also has a communitarian dimension, as is clear in the Lord's call to a whole Church: "Repent!"

St Ambrose says of the two CONVERSIONS that, in the Church, "there are water and tears: the water of Baptism and the tears of repentance."

The Code of Canon Law confirms the practice of offering Mass(es) for particular intentions is ancient: "The Christian faithful who give an offering to apply the Mass for their intention contribute to the good of the Church and by that offering share its concern to support its ministers and works" (945 §2). Masses with no intention are offered for the Holy Souls in Purgatory.
