

From the Desk of Father Steve: Happy Feast of Pentecost!



Through the Spirit we acquire a likeness to God; indeed, we attain what is beyond our most sublime aspirations—we become God. -St. Basil the Great (d. 379 AD)

I wish you all a very blessed celebration of Pentecost as we celebrate both the great day of the outpouring of God the Holy Spirit upon His Church, as well as the formal ending to the Easter Season today. The quote above from one of the great Church Fathers, St. Basil, may strike us as difficult to understand at first. How in the world can we, poor and sinful creatures that we are, become God!? Well, recall that in the tradition of the Eastern Catholic Church (we are Latin rite, or “Western” Roman Catholics), the theological idea of “deification” is something which is commonly believed and preached- the idea that through God’s coming to dwell within a soul by grace, especially when one lives the fullness of the sacramental life of the Church, God actually raises that soul to His own level through divine adoption. We westerners believe this as well, but it is a doctrine that is not often emphasized as much as it should be, in my opinion. After all, that was the entire purpose of Jesus’ saving mission on earth- God became a human being like us, so that through God, we might become God. Notice, this is totally and completely *God’s doing*- it’s at His initiative, it’s His grace at work in us, it’s He who adopts us as His children, allows us to share in His divine nature through grace and the sacraments, and Who, we hope, will one day unite us to Himself in the eternal bliss of heaven. God desires to so fully share Himself with us that we become like Him- we become another Christ to the world around us. It’s what St. Paul so humbly yet confidently stated: “It is no longer I who live, but Christ Who lives in me” (Galatians 2:20). Brothers and sisters- By God’s gift of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in us, we are called to be so united with Him that we share His very nature and likeness! Praise God for His generous gifts! Below is a fuller excerpt from St. Basil the Great from which the quote above is taken.

From a treatise On the Holy Spirit by Saint Basil the Great, Bishop and Doctor of the Church:

Simple in himself, the Spirit is manifold in his mighty works. The whole of his being is present to each individual; the whole of his being is present everywhere. Though shared in by many, he remains unchanged; his self-giving is no loss to himself. Like the sunshine, which permeates all the atmosphere, spreading over land and sea, and yet is enjoyed by each person as though it were for him alone, so the Spirit pours forth his grace in full measure, sufficient for all, and yet is present as though exclusively to everyone who can receive him. To all creatures that share in him he gives a delight limited only by their own nature, not by his ability to give.

As clear, transparent substances become very bright when sunlight falls on them and shine with a new radiance, so also souls in whom the Spirit dwells, and who are enlightened by the Spirit, become spiritual themselves and a source of grace for others.

From the Spirit comes foreknowledge of the future, understanding of the mysteries of faith, insight into the hidden meaning of Scripture, and other special gifts. Through the Spirit we become citizens of heaven, we enter into eternal happiness, and abide in God. Through the Spirit we acquire a likeness to God; indeed, we attain what is beyond our most sublime aspirations—we become God.

Touring the church—the ambo

You will notice that as of this week we have a new ambo, designed and built by the McMahons to match the new altars. On the angled edges you will see plaques of the four evangelists as well as the Alpha & Omega. These six plaques were previously brown and hung on the reredos flanking the crucifix. Lisa Parkos from DeNardo statuary painted the plaques bringing out the details for us to enjoy. You may be wondering about the figures which represent each of the evangelists. Aleteia.org explains: **Matthew** is associated with the winged man — or the angel — because his Gospel focuses on the humanity of Christ. The lion is related to St. Mark because his Gospel emphasizes the majesty of Christ and his royal dignity, just as the lion has traditionally been regarded as the king of beasts. Mark's Gospel begins with the prophetic voice of John the Baptist, crying out in the wilderness like a lion's roar. Luke gets the ox, because his gospel focuses on the sacrificial character of Christ's death, and the ox has always been a sacrificial animal *par excellence*, both for Judaism and Roman paganism. In Luke's depiction of the Nativity, the ox, with the donkey, bears witness to the birth of the Messiah. John, finally, is associated with the eagle for two reasons: first, because his Gospel describes the Incarnation of the divine Logos, and the eagle is a symbol of *that which comes from above*. The second, because like the eagle, John — in his Revelation — was able to see beyond what is immediately present. *“And the first beast was a lion, the second beast as a calf, the third beast had the face of a man, and the fourth beast was like an eagle.”* - Revelation 4:7

COVID protocols loosening in accord with Diocesan guidelines:

Effective May 22: Congregational singing will resume, and hymnals will be returned to the pews.

Effective Friday, May 28: Social distancing and congregation size limits will cease, which means:

- All ribbons currently roping off certain pews for social distancing protocols will be removed.
- Holy water fonts will be returned and filled for use.
- We will resume two lines for Holy Communion which are side-by-side in the center aisle.
- The sacrament of confession will once again be celebrated in the confessional in the Church proper (no longer in the education center at Holy Spirit or the cry room at St. Mary's).
- Funeral luncheons, social gatherings and all other in-person meetings and activities at the parish may resume.

Practices that will remain in place after May 28, 2021:

- The obligation to attend Sunday Mass remains lifted until our Administrator or our Bishop reinstates it.
- The clergy and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion will continue to wear a mask while they are distributing Holy Communion to the faithful for the time being.
- Music at Mass will continue to be provided by a cantor or small schola who lead the singing.
- The distribution of Holy Communion under the species of the Consecrated Bread only will continue.
- Hand sanitizer will be available for parishioners' use, however, there will not be as many sanitizing stations.
- The exchange of the Sign of Peace at Mass will not resume yet.

Effective July 1:

- The use of a full choir for leading music at Mass can resume.
- The Sign of Peace during Mass will resume, to be exchanged at each parishioner's discretion.
- The Distribution of the Precious Blood may resume, provided that there are sufficient Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion prepared and scheduled, and that Fr. Steve has judged it prudent to do so.
