A REVIEW OF PENTECOST SUNDAY

Pentecost Sunday is a commemoration and celebration of the receiving of the Holy Spirit by the early church. John the Baptist prophesied of the first Pentecost when Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire (Matthew 3:11). Jesus confirmed this prophecy with the promise of the Holy Spirit to the disciples in John 14:26. He showed Himself to these men after His death on the cross and His resurrection, giving convincing proofs that He was alive. Jesus told the disciples to wait in Jerusalem for the Father's gift of the Holy Spirit, from whom they would receive power to be His witnesses to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:3-8). After Jesus' ascension to heaven, the men returned to Jerusalem and joined together in prayer in an upper room. On the Day of Pentecost, just as promised, the sound of a violent wind filled the house and tongues of fire came to rest on each of them and all were filled with the Holy Spirit. They were given the power of communication, which Peter used to begin the ministry for which Jesus had prepared him. After the coming of the Holy Spirit, the disciples did not stay in the room basking in God's glory but burst out to tell the world. This was the beginning of the church as we know it.

Today, in many Christian churches, Pentecost Sunday is celebrated to recognize the gift of the Holy Spirit, realizing that God's very life, breath and energy live in believers. During this service, John 20:19-23 may be the core of the message about our risen Savior supernaturally appearing to the fear-laden disciples. Their fear gave way to joy when the Lord showed them His hands and side. He assured them peace and repeated the command given in Matthew 28:19-20, saying, "As the Father has sent me, I am

sending you." Then He breathed on them, and they received the Holy Spirit (John 20:21-23).

The celebration of Pentecost Sunday reminds us of the reality that we all have the unifying Spirit that was poured out upon the first-century church in Acts 2:1-4. It is a reminder that we are co-heirs with Christ, to suffer with Him that we may also be glorified with Him; that the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good (1 Corinthians 12:7); that we are all baptized by one Spirit into one body (1 Corinthians 12:13); and that the Spirit which raised Jesus from the dead lives inside believers (Romans 8:9-11). This gift of the Holy Spirit that was promised and given to all believers on the first Pentecost is promised for you and your children and for all who are far off whom the Lord our God will call (Acts 2:39).

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- 1. What times will the Masses begin?**
 - a. Our Mass schedule times have not changed: Morning Masses are 7:30am and 8:30am; Weekend Masses are Saturday 4pm and Sunday 7:30am, 9:30am, 11:30am, 5pm and 7:00pm in Spanish
- 2. How do we enter the church for Mass?**
 - a. For everyone's safety, only the front doors of the church will be used.
- 3. Will the chapel be available for use?**
 - a. Until further notice, the chapel will be closed and not for use.
- 4. Do we need to practice the safe distance (6') guidance while in church?**
 - a. Yes. Only families should sit together. All others should space themselves at least 6' apart. We will also be using **only** every other pew, as indicated by the ribbons. It is suggested that you sit in the middle of the pews so that others can have access to the pews without you having to move.
- 5. Should we sanitize our hands in church?**
 - a. Yes. There are hand sanitizers located in the Narthex and in the church. You are encouraged to use on entering and on leaving the church.
- 6. Will we be able to receive Communion?**
 - a. Yes. All who are prepared, will be able to receive Communion (The Body) and the Bishop said we should receive in the hand.
- 7. Where do we place our weekly envelopes, etc.?**
 - a. There will be two baskets in the Narthex for this purpose, one for each collection. Thanks for your continued generosity.
- 8. Will there be weekly bulletins?**
 - a. Yes. Bulletins will be distributed by the Greeters at the conclusion of Mass.
- 9. Will there be access to the bathrooms?**
 - a. All Mass attendees are requested to use the bathrooms only for emergency purposes. Mass attendees will not have access to the Sacristy.
- 10. Are we still collecting food for the food pantry?**
 - a. Yes. The need continues and our support is appreciated by those who receive your contributions.

The Greeters and other volunteers will assist you with questions. Also, please refer to the church website www.stlucie.cc and Flocknotes for updates.

All Mass attendees are requested to exercise patience and practice safe behaviors as we adjust to the new procedures.

ATTENTION ALL MINISTRY HEADS!

SILENCE IN CHURCH

For many of us, keeping silent in church is not an easy task. For others, while engaged in prayer many recognize unnecessary noise before and after Mass. Although most of us know that church should be a quiet zone, we battle keeping ourselves silent or conveying silence in others.

We beckon silence not just to allow ourselves the pleasure of prayer in quiet. It has everything to do with the sanctity of the Mass. Quiet can permeate sacred space and make it a place in which we instinctively feel a "difference" in the air. It invites us to contribute to maintaining this atmosphere.

And what if all the pleas for silence fall on deaf ears? "We can still respond in silence. St. John of the Cross suggested, "Whenever anything disagreeable or displeasing happens to you, remember Christ crucified and be silent." Distractions can be filtered, and meditation can be with noise, but this is an acquired attribute. Think about Calvary and the soldiers who gambled at the

foot of the cross. Criminals jeered from both sides until one was inexplicably moved by Christ's silence. Spectators heckled... only a handful of people, including his Mother and his beloved disciples stood nearby in sorrowful silence." Visualize this and suddenly noise around you becomes less of a distraction and more of an aid to recreating the experience of Calvary." (1)

In church we display our "shhhh" sign, but this is unfortunately viewed by some as no more than a suggestion or adornment. As individuals we can enter into our sacred place with a refreshed view that silence is golden and remind ourselves that we can make a difference. Many would be grateful if talk is kept in the rotunda before or after entering or exiting the church.

A WORD ABOUT BURIAL AND CREMATION...

As Catholics, we believe in the resurrection of the body –you say you believe this every time you say the Creed during Mass or during the Rosary prayers. Because of this, a body cremated after death needs to be treated in the same way that a body not cremated after death is treated: it must be buried. Ashes and bone fragments cannot be scattered in the air, over land, or (in the sea unless placed in a container following regulations); they cannot be divided up among family members or friends; they cannot be kept at home or placed in lockets or other mementos. Ashes must be stored in a burial container and placed in a Church-approved place, such as a cemetery, where they can be either buried in the ground or placed in a niche. Remember, “the dead body isn’t the private property of relatives, but rather a son of God who is part of the people of God.” (Cardinal Gerhard Mueller). Faithful Catholics believe in the resurrection of the body and must do everything to avoid appearing pantheistic or to be a proponent of naturalism or nihilism. In 1963, the Vatican explicitly allowed cremation as long as it didn’t suggest a denial of faith about resurrection.

CHURCH POOR BOXES

There are four “Poor Boxes” located in the church: one above each table beside St. Michael (as you enter or depart the Church.) Two additional poor boxes are located by the side entrance/exit doors. Your contributions truly go to help the poor. These days are critical many times and we do our best to provide for our sisters and brothers in need. Thank you for your generosity.

SACRAMENTS AND CELEBRATIONS

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: At least one parent must be an active, participating, and registered as a member of the parish. Parental attendance at a two-hour preparatory workshop is required prior to the baptism. The class is usually offered in English on the second Wednesday of every month, and in Spanish on the first Wednesday of every month. Class begins at 7:00 PM in the Parish Office Conference Room located at 425 SW Irving Street. Parents are asked to phone the Parish Office before the class to confirm date and time. All baptismal requirements are outlined in a booklet that will be distributed at the baptismal class. Upon fulfilling and submitting the baptism booklet, all is reviewed and if all requirements have been met, a date for baptism will be set (but no sooner than one month.) Baptisms are celebrated at 12:45 PM on Sundays. Spanish Baptisms: 1st and 3rd Sundays, English Baptisms: 2nd and 4th Sundays.

SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: Please contact Andrea Draper, SOFS, Director of Religious Education, for more information. Call (772) 878-1215. Older candidates wishing to be confirmed must first complete an adult religious education program.

SACRAMENT OF FIRST EUCHARIST: First Eucharist is usually celebrated in the second grade. Parents who are registered members of the parish are to contact the Director of Religious Education at (772) 878-1215 to register their child for the First Eucharist Program beginning first grade. Preparation is a two-year program!

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: Marriages are celebrated on Fridays at various times and Saturdays at 11:00 AM and 1:00 PM only. Engaged couples should contact the church office a minimum of six months in advance in order to complete the necessary preparation. At least one member of the couple **MUST** be a registered and participating member of the parish for a minimum of six months prior to initially contacting the church. If the annulment of a previous marriage (Catholic, Non-Catholic, or civil) is required before a Catholic remarriage can take place, please contact the Annulment Advocate, Anne Tienter or Rosemary Konas. For more information call (772) 878-1215.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION: Reconciliation is celebrated each Saturday from 2:30 – 3:30 PM in the church, or by prearranged appointment with one of the staff priests. It is also celebrated on First Friday from 7:00 to 7:20 AM and 8:00 to 8:20 AM. Seasonal Reconciliation services are also held during both Advent and Lent. “First Reconciliation” for children is celebrated each February for second grade religious education students. Contact the Parish Religious Education Office for information.

PREGUNTAS FRECUENTES

1. ¿A qué hora comenzarán las misas?

Los horarios de nuestras misas no han cambiado: las misas de la mañana zona las 7:30 AM y 8:30 AM. Las misas de fin de semana son los sábados a las 4:00 PM y los domingos a las 7:30 AM, 9:30 AM, 11:30 AM, 5:00 PM, y 7:00 pm en español.

2. ¿Cómo entramos a la iglesia para la misa?

Para la seguridad de todos, sólo se utilizarán las puertas de entrada de la iglesia.

3. ¿La capilla estará disponible para su uso?

Hasta nuevo aviso, la capilla estará cerrada y no se utilizará.

4. ¿Necesitamos practicar la guía de distancia segura (6') mientras estamos en la iglesia?

Si. Sólo las familias deben sentarse juntas. Todos los demás deben espaciarse al menos a 6 'de distancia. También usaremos solo cualquier otro banco, como lo indican las cintas. Se sugiere que se siente en medio de los bancos para que otros puedan tener acceso a los bancos sin que tenga que moverse.

5. ¿Debemos desinfectar nuestras manos en la iglesia?

Si. Hay desinfectantes para manos ubicados en el Narthex y en la iglesia. Se les recomienda usarlo al entrar y al salir de la iglesia.

6. ¿Podremos recibir la comunión?

Si. Todos los que estén preparados podrán recibir la Comunión (el Cuerpo) y el Obispo Barbarito ha dicho que deberíamos recibirla hostia en la mano.

7. ¿Dónde colocamos nuestros sobres semanales, etc.?

Habrán dos cestas en el Narthex para este propósito, una por cada colecta. Gracias por su continua generosidad.

8. ¿Habrán boletines semanales?

Si. Los ujieres distribuirán los boletines al final de la misa.

9. ¿Habrán acceso a los baños?

Se solicita a todos los asistentes a la misa que usen los baños sólo en caso de una emergencia. Los feligreses no tendrán acceso a la Sacristía.

10. ¿Todavía seguimos recolectando comida para la despensa?
