## Monaghan Honored for 51 Years' Service

A small, quiet physician and surgeon, Dr. Edward P. Monaghan, stood before an audience of 1,100 persons in Hotel Hollenden last night and said he had "sincere pleasure" at the honor he was receiving.

It was an honor, Dr. Monaghan, a member of the Knights of Columbus for 51 years in Cleveland, was the center of attraction at a banquet sponsored by the Fourth Degree of the K. of C. A class of 205 candidates was named in his honor.

Dr. Monaghan is former chief of staff at St. Ann's Hospital. He is a staff member there and at St. Vincent Charity Hospital. For many years he served as a teacher at the school of medicine of Western Reserve University.

# Guard Against Erroneous Beliefs, Dr. Drew Warns

Too many people have had the mistaken idea that through evolution, humanity develops automatically and religion is not important. Dr. George E. Drew said in his sermon yesterday at L. A. L. Wood Congregational Church.

White science has brought us many wonderful benefits and promises to bring us many more. We need to guard against the erroneous belief that science itself can be our answer, the minister stated.

Scoring a number of what he called erroneous "fixed ideas," he pointed to nationalism as one, which, he noted, is "throwing the world into critical danger."

"Ideas Are Dangerous"

Preaching on the theme "Ideas Are Dangerous," Dr. Drew observed that many Americans cannot understand other countries' resistance to the idea that "what is good for America must be good for the rest of the world."

"We are being forced overnight to grow up, and this is a painful process," he asserted.

The most influential noble idea, he emphasized, is that fostered by Christ, that the individual person is of infinite importance.

"Life is a matter of sharing, working in cooperation with people around you who are carrying a burden of soul of infinite value, without limit," Dr. Drew stressed.

"Soul '99% Asleep"

This soul within us, he added, "is 99% asleep, like the nucleus of the atom. God is forever trying to send His 'rays' against it to 'crack it open' and release its power."

If this power "could just be

gin to be released," he offered, "the transformation of our sick, tired old world, would be on the way."

The minister warned against the mistake of attempting to apply the idea of evolution outside its realm. For example, he said, what a "dismal mistake" to think that newer music is far superior to the old classics, simply because it has developed more recently. Similarly, he recalled that in the 1930s it was popular to regard the Old Testament, and even the New Testament, as an "interesting relic, but not very important."

"Too, Dr. Drew recounted, we mistakenly thought after World War I that man had developed so high that we could never return to barbarism."

### Meek Found Rare

Meekness is a rare attribute of Christians today. Meekness will make us happier Christians, for it will prevent us from permitting other persons disturbing or irritating us, and we shall better enjoy ourselves and others, the Rev. Edwin W. Miller said in his sermon at Parma Heights Baptist Church.

Calling meekness "a great price to God," the minister said it indicated a personal victory over one's own spirit and also over circumstances, which may be adverse. Further, he pointed out that meekness expresses victory over one's enemies by making the enemy his friend.

The sermon was the last in a series of six on the theme of meekness. Basically, the Rev. Mr. Miller pointed out, the only description Jesus made of himself, as recorded in the New Testament is: "I am meek and lowly of heart."
