

MINISTRY EVENTS


DAILY RECITATION OF THE ROSARY



REOPENING CHURCH

Church has reopened with the following weekend schedule:

Saturday Vigil: 2:00, 4:00 and 6:00 PM

Sunday Mass: 7:00, 9:00 and 11:00 AM and 5:00 PM.

For those who have concerns about attending weekend Mass at this time:

"The obligation to attend Mass on Sunday is lifted until further notice." – Bishop John Noonan

If you have reservations about coming to church on the weekends, think about coming to daily mass to be able to receive the Blessed Sacrament.

A few items of importance:

- We ask all parishioners to wear a mask as an act of charity to one another.. Please remove mask when receiving communion.
- Entry will be through the Main Entrance to the church (off 441/27). **Handicap entry is currently closed.**
- When the number of parishioners equals the number of persons permitted, remaining parishioners will be directed to the Hall until that fills.
- Holy Water fonts are empty. Health safety restrictions will not allow the use of the sacramental of Holy Water in this way. However, it is most appropriate to continue the gesture of making the sign of the cross upon entering church.
- There will be no basket passed during the collection. Baskets will be available at the doors of the church to accept your donations.
- Sign of Peace—it will be appropriate to offer a reverent bow and or verbal greeting.
- Reception of Holy Communion will be in the form of the Sacred Host only and will be received on the hand.
- There will be no Hymnals or Missals available. If you wish to access the information on your phone, that will be acceptable at this time.
- When leaving church, please remember to maintain social distancing. Wave from afar and leave the church property to share fellowship.

SAINT BENEDICT

SAINT OF THE DAY FOR JULY 11

(c. 480 – c. 547)

SAINT BENEDICT'S STORY

It is unfortunate that no contemporary biography was written of a man who has exercised the greatest influence on monasticism in the West. Benedict is well recognized in the later *Dialogues* of Saint Gregory, but these are sketches to illustrate miraculous elements of his career.

Benedict was born into a distinguished family in central Italy, studied at Rome, and early in life was drawn to monasticism. At first he became a hermit, leaving a depressing world—pagan armies on the march, the Church torn by schism, people suffering from war, morality at a low ebb.

He soon realized that he could not live a hidden life in a small town any better than in a large city, so he withdrew to a cave high in the mountains for three years. Some monks chose Benedict as their leader for a while, but found his strictness not to their taste. Still the shift from hermit to community life had begun for him. He had an idea of gathering various families of monks into one "Grand Monastery" to give them the benefit of unity, fraternity, and permanent worship in one house. Finally he began to build what was to become one of the most famous monasteries in the world—Monte Cassino, commanding three narrow valleys running toward the mountains north of Naples.

The Rule that gradually developed prescribed a life of liturgical prayer, study, manual labor, and living together in community under a common abbot. Benedictine asceticism is known for its moderation, and Benedictine charity has always shown concern for the people in the surrounding countryside. In the course of the Middle Ages, all monasticism in the West was gradually brought under the *Rule of St. Benedict*.

Today the Benedictine family is represented by two branches: the Benedictine Federation encompassing the men and women of the Order of St. Benedict, and the Cistercians, men and women of the Order of Cistercians of the Strict Observance.

REFLECTION

The Church has been blessed through Benedictine devotion to the liturgy, not only in its actual celebration with rich and proper ceremony in the great abbeys, but also through the scholarly studies of many of its members. Liturgy is sometimes confused with guitars or choirs, Latin or Bach. We should be grateful to those who both preserve and adapt the genuine tradition of worship in the Church.

- 4) We've improved search functionality to make it easier to find the faith forming content you're looking for.


New content including: *Lectio Divina* and *YDisciple* content for youth ministry.

This website, in a video for preparation for catechists, states two current alarming states of our Catholic faith.


First, only 30% of Catholics believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. Second, only 48% of Catholics have a personal relationship with Jesus. **SAINT OF THE DAY FOR JULY 6
(OCTOBER 16, 1890 – JULY 6, 1902)**

SAINT MARIA GORETTI’S STORY

One of the largest crowds ever assembled for a canonization—250,000—symbolized the reaction of millions touched by the simple story of Maria Goretti. She was the daughter of a poor Italian tenant farmer, had no chance to go to school, never learned to read or write. When Maria made her First Communion not long before her death at age 12, she was one of the larger and somewhat backward members of the class.

On a hot afternoon in July, Maria was sitting at the top of the stairs of her house, mending a shirt. She was not quite 12 years old, but physically mature. A cart stopped outside, and a neighbor, 18-year-old Alessandro, ran up the stairs. He seized her and pulled her into a bedroom. She struggled and tried to call for help. “No, God does not wish it,” she cried out. “It is a sin. You would go to hell for it.” Alessandro began striking at her blindly with a long dagger.

Maria was taken to a hospital. Her last hours were marked by the usual simple compassion of the good—concern about where her mother would sleep, forgiveness of her murderer (she had been in fear of him, but did not say anything lest she cause trouble to his family), and her devout welcoming of Viaticum, her last Holy Communion. She died about 24 hours after the attack.

Alessandro was sentenced to 30 years in prison. For a long time he was unrepentant and surly. One night he had a dream or vision of Maria gathering flowers and offering them to him. His life changed. When he was released after 27 years, his first act was to beg the forgiveness of Maria’s mother.

Devotion to the young martyr grew, miracles were worked, and in less than half a century she was canonized. At her beatification in 1947, her 82-year-old mother, two sisters, and her brother appeared with Pope Pius XII on the balcony of St. Peter’s. Three years later, at Maria’s canonization, a 66-year-old Alessandro Serenelli knelt among the quarter-million people and cried tears of joy.

REFLECTION

Maria may have had trouble with catechism, but she had no trouble with faith. God’s will was holiness, decency, respect for one’s body, absolute obedience, total trust. In a complex world, her faith was simple: It is a privilege to be loved by God, and to love him—at any cost.
