


Carson Haupt...

Praying at home

Not being able to partake of the Church's liturgy at church does not mean we can't be part of the Church's liturgy at home. The Liturgy of the Hours is the official prayer of the Catholic Church. The liturgy consists of a collection of psalms, prayers, and readings prayed throughout the day at specific times (for example Morning and Evening Prayer). This form of worship is very flexible and you can pray individually or in a group. Amid coronavirus outbreak, Divine Office is opening registrations temporarily to allow people in the United States to join in prayer. We hope more people will find spiritual nourishment, strength and consolation in praying the Liturgy of the Hours as we all go through these difficult, uncertain times. Sacrament of Reconciliation

Our Bishop's directives, as other bishops', are intriguing: Must be in the open, behind a screen, confessor and penitent six feet apart, music playing to ensure no one else hears the confession. It might be good to take note of the counsel of Bishop Francesco Beschi, the Bishop of Pope John XXIII's home diocese: "The Church says that if I intend to confess sacramentally as soon as possible, I have already received God's forgiveness. I want to remind the faithful of this possibility."

Getting back to Mass...

...offered publicly is being discussed by the Bishops of Kansas and of the US, as well as, throughout the world. Pope Francis recently urged prudence and obedience to pandemic protocols to prevent the coronavirus from surging even as civil leadership begins lessening some restrictions. There are many things to consider. One certainty is that anyone who is in a vulnerable group should not come to mass whenever it again is offered in public until it is deemed "safe". Mass will not return to "normal" for some time after it is offered publically. There will be a great number of restrictions as to numbers, singing, receiving Holy Communion, as well as, extensive cleaning before and after. When and how are questions that seem to have elusive answers. But they are being discussed with much input from many avenues.

Let us continue praying for one another

We hold our President, Governor, and all elected leaders in prayer that they receive wisdom and guidance in keeping people safe.

We ask blessings on all medical personnel and all involved in essential work. May they be protected.

We intercede for those who have been infected by the covid-19 virus, for their families, for all awaiting test results.
