## LIVING OUR FAITH

### *From the Desk of Fr. Tom Pastorius...*

- 1. Seminarians:** This year we are blest to have two seminarians from Kenrick-Glennon Seminarians assigned to us. David Biachini, a St. Louis native will be assisting with Sunday Masses and with our youth group. Scott Watts is a seminarian from Omaha. He is in the third year of his graduate studies and so he is to assist me in ministering to the sick and the elderly. So if you are currently taking communion to a homebound person ask them if they would like a visit from us and then notify the rectory.
- 2. Homecoming Raffle Tickets:** Last year's homecoming was a special homecoming for me as I watched parishioners and friends of Epiphany parish go the extra mile and sell out the parish raffle for the first time in like eight years. The effort and generosity of so many allowed us to purchase a new air conditioner to replace the broken unit in Church. As this year's homecoming approaches, I ask you to please to put in the same effort and energy into selling this year's raffle tickets because the second air conditioner unit on the Church has reached an age where it could break at anytime and we would like to be ready to purchase a new one. Remember you can purchase a whole ticket for \$100.00 or \$1/10 of ticket for \$10. The prize for this year is once again \$10,000. Please help us sell all 300 tickets.
- 3. Homecoming a Great Way to Get Involved:** Each week, I am seeing more and more new people and that is awesome. I know though from experience, that some of the new people will drift away unless they seize an opportunity to help build up the parish community outside of Mass. Homecoming can be a great way to get involved in parish life and meet your fellow parishioners. Please contact the office to learn about the many volunteer opportunities available at this year's homecoming.
- 4 Annulment Workshop:** On October 16, 2014\* at 7 PM in Church, Deacon Tom Forster will be here to give a presentation on annulments. I have known Deacon Forster for over 10 years now and often I like to refer to him as the "Perry Mason of Annulments" because he always goes the extra mile to help people who find themselves in this difficult situation. Please consider coming to this event even if you are not looking for an annulment so that you may have a better understanding of the Church's teaching on this difficult topic. You may be able to help someone else in the future set their relationship with God straight. \* October 16<sup>th</sup> is the date. Last week I had the wrong date listed.
- 5. Convocation:** The week of September 15<sup>th</sup> to the 19<sup>th</sup> the priest of the Archdiocese of St. Louis will gather together at the Lake of the Ozarks for a week of faith development, fellowship, and fun. This event takes place once every four years. Therefore the week of September 15<sup>th</sup> to the 19<sup>th</sup>, instead of there being a Mass there will be a communion service. If you are looking for Mass this week I would suggest St. Vincent's, St. Anthony of Padua, and St. Francis Xavier (College Church) as these parishes are run by religious orders and not by diocesan priests. If I discover other parishes having Masses during that week, I will let you know.
- 6. A Challenge to Parents:** I would like to challenge parents to go the extra mile this school year with their child's faith formation by signing up your child for one of our three youth programs. We have Blue Knights for K-5 boys and we have Little Flowers for K-5 girls. Both of these programs are open to children, who are attending Catholic Schools, PSR, or nothing at all. These programs combine the fun of scouting (games, crafts, and earning patches) with a great opportunity for children to learn more about their faith. For 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> graders we have an exciting new program called Young Disciples. In this program middle school teens will learn more about the Bible from The Bible Geek Mark Hart. All three of these programs start on September 2nd. Classes will be held every Tuesday in the parish gym from 6:30-8:00 PM.
- 7. A Challenge to Adults:** Deacon Tetreault will be facilitating a great adult education program called Pillars of the Faith - The Creed on the first and third Tuesday of the Month from 7-8:30PM. The video program from Ascension Press will take us through the different parts of the Creed so that we can come to a better understanding of what it is that we truly believe as Catholics. This program also starts on September 2<sup>nd</sup>. We will also be having great Men's and Women's Sessions on the Second Tuesday of the Month from 7-8:30PM with babysitting being provided for all programs.
- 8. Thinking about being coming Catholic or know someone who is?:** "If something is missing in your life, if there is an emptiness you cannot explain, know that Jesus Christ can fill the void. Think about finding him in the Catholic Church, the Church Jesus Himself founded 2,000 years ago." Pope Benedict XVI. Special classes will be beginning soon for those who are interested in becoming Catholic or adults who are in need of the Sacrament of Confirmation. Please contact Michael Rennie at 314.781.1199.
- 9. Children Sacramental Education Programs beginning soon:** Children in need of Sacramental Preparation who are not attending a Catholic school please contact Michael Rennie 314.781.1199 so we get you enrolled in our First Reconciliation/Communion class or our Confirmation class.
- 10. Tweaking the Tuesday Mass Schedule:** Starting September 2<sup>nd</sup> the Tuesday evening Mass will be at 5:30 PM instead of 6PM. This will allow us to begin our Faith & Family program earlier for the smaller children so that their parents can put them to sleep at a more reasonable hour and it will allow some parishioners who desire to attend Mass but can't because their shift starts at 7PM to begin attending Mass. Once again this change will not take place until the First Tuesday of September.

We have reached our last Spiritual Pondering this month on the Eucharist and so let us continue our reflections on the Sacrament of the Eucharist. As we do this we turn to Fr. Ronald Rolheiser's book: *Our One Great Act of Fidelity: Waiting for Christ in the Eucharist* because in the second part of his book, Fr. Rolheiser looks at the Eucharist from 12 different perspectives. The quotes from his book will be in bold and my personal commentary will be in the regular font.

### 10: The Eucharist as a Ritual to Sustain our Health

Today, unfortunately, we are misled by a number of misconceptions about prayer and liturgy. Too commonly we accept the following set of axioms as wise: Creativity and variety are always good. Every prayer-celebration should be one of high energy. Longer is better than shorter. Either you should pray with feeling or you shouldn't pray at all. Ritual is meaningless unless we are emotionally invested in it.

Each of these axioms is overly romantic, ill thought out, anthropologically naïve, and not helpful in sustaining a life of prayer. Prayer is a relationship, a long-term one, and lives by those rules. Relating to anyone long-term has its ups and downs. Nobody can be interesting all the time, sustain high energy all the time, or fully invest himself or herself all time. Never travel with anyone who expects you to be interesting, lively, and emotionally invested all the time. Real life doesn't work that way. Neither does prayer. What sustains a relationship over the long term is ritual, routine, a regular rhythm that incarnates the commitment.

I wish I could write a book about each of the above misconceptions but let me start simply by saying that prayer is above all about relationship with the Blessed Trinity. Sometimes my friendship with another is deepened only after we have spent a whole day together and other times it is deepened by a short fifteen minute conversation. The same can be said with my relationship with God. There are times in which I enjoy doing new things with friends like taking a trip to somewhere I have never been and there are times in which I enjoy doing the same thing over and over again with friends like play a card game. There is something nice about the Mass in which it is always the same but yet no two Masses are ever celebrated the same way.

### 11: The Eucharist as a Vigil, As A Communal Rite of Waiting

We are always waiting. The Eucharist is meant to help us with that. Among other things, it is meant to be a vigil, a coming together to wait for someone or something new to happen to us. We meet Eucharist to wait with each other. The Eucharist is meant to be a vigil.

It is important to remind ourselves that we are waiting for the second coming of our Lord. We do not want to be caught off guard like the foolish virgins in Matthew 25. We also know that the Lord said "like a thief in the night" Matthew 24. It is always easier to keep guard with a partner. As a Church community we get a foretaste of heaven by receiving the Eucharist because God comes to us in this awesome and silent way.

### 12: The Eucharist As the Priestly Prayer of Christ

One of the things asked of us by adulthood itself, and more especially by our baptism, is that we pray for others. Like the high priests of old, we need to offer up prayer daily for the whole world.

Archbishop Fulton Sheen labeled the part of the Gospel of John where Jesus prays as the Lord's "My Father." Fulton Sheen went forth to write: "During the Last Supper Our Blessed Lord used the word "Father" forty-five times. Up until then, the world had only known the Supreme Being as God. He now emphasized that God is a Father, because of His intimate and paternal attitude toward men." The Eucharist reminds us that our Heavenly Father does listen to us His adoptive Sons and Daughters. At the Eucharist we can offer up the things that matter most to us because we know if they matter to us then they matter to our heavenly Father.

## Lectionary: 124 - Gospel [mt 16:21-27](#)

**Spiritual Reflection:** Archbishop Fulton Sheen writes the following about Peter in his book on the priesthood: "Peter was willing to confess Christ the Priest, but not Christ the Victim. Men called to be rocks can become stones of stumbling.

The priesthood means imitation of Christ, and imitation means self-crucifixion. An unwillingness on the part of a priest to follow Christ to Calvary can sound to Our Blessed Lord only like the voice of the devil himself, that is to say, the voice of Simon repeating the sentiments with which Satan at the very start of Christ's public life had tried to tempt Him away from the Cross. Our Lord did not take away Peter's vocation. He contented Himself with warning him that the flesh was with him and that in a moment of overconfidence he would fall. Peter is thus set forth by Our Blessed Lord as a constant reminder that it is in their strongest qualities, unless they are periodically renewed by divine grace, that men are most liable to fail."
