Dear Parish Family,

“Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you.” These words are spoken to Bartimaeus in the Gospel as he calls out to the Lord for healing. When Jesus finally reaches him and asks what he wants done for him, Bartimaeus replies, “Master, I want to see.” Upon healing him, Jesus tells him to go his way, but Bartimeaus immediately chooses to follow Jesus on the way after receiving his sight. He sees clearly and knows what he must do. What a great story of conversion and discipleship.

This is precisely the challenge offered to us as well. As we call out to God in prayer and petition, we hopefully realize that Jesus is calling us, too. Do we have the sight to see where He is asking us to follow and, more importantly, are we willing to proceed on the way? For Jesus, the next stop on the journey is Jerusalem, where He will endure the passion, crucifixion and ultimately the resurrection. There are no short cuts in the path. Jesus must continue to walk the way and proceed through each step. So, too, must we.

Yes, our call is to become disciples, as well, to follow the Lord with the whole of our lives at each and every moment. Our task is to remain on the way despite the obstacles and diversions that we may encounter to take us off track. Left to ourselves, the road becomes difficult to travel. However, we have the grace of the Holy Spirit to lead and guide us and keep us moving forward.

No matter our states in life, all of us have that universal call to holiness. Like Bartimaeus, each of us has a story of how we began to see how the Lord called us. This weekend, we celebrate the ordination of five men ordained to the transitional diaconate in our diocese. For them, this is a step on the journey of following Jesus on the way to sharing in His priesthood. Each of them has a story, too. Each of them responded without reservation to follow Christ. The rest of us are called to support and pray for them as we walk with them on the way.

We are also called to support and pray for a continued increase in vocations to priesthood and consecrated religious life. We do this best by living out our own vocations to their fullest potential. For those in married life, maintaining a nurturing, prayerful and loving family helps promote vocations by the witness that family offers to others. For those already in ordained ministry and consecrated life, they promote vocations through humble service and perseverance despite obstacles and difficulties they encounter when bringing the Presence of Christ to others.

So, the ultimate lesson of Bartitmaeus for us is not to lose our sight once we have it. If our vision has become blurry, ask the Lord to make it clear again. Let us always be ready to respond to hearing, “Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you.”

Dying Catholic: Medical and Moral Issues At the End of Life – Special Presentation at Holy Rosary on November 11th

The end of life (which can happen at any time of life!) is part of our journey to God; but in the modern world, it can bring with it complex and puzzling decisions that were not faced by earlier generations.

When can one insist on treatment – when can one reject it? Is organ donation morally good, bad, or neutral? How do doctors define death nowadays? What do the terms ordinary and extraordinary treatment mean? Why have some countries, and U.S. states, legalized assisted suicide, and what should a Catholic think about it? What is euthanasia? Is a Living Will a good thing? What can you do if your Catholic values are not acknowledged – or understood – by medical personnel?

These are some of the issues that will be addressed by Fr. Joseph Koopman, Assistant Professor of Moral Theology at St. Mary Seminary. His talk will be given in Holy Rosary's church hall on **Wednesday night, November 11, at 7:00 p.m.** There will be plenty of opportunities for you to ask questions also.

By purchasing fairly traded foods and handcrafts, we are making a conscious choice to buy from poor people in a way that promises to help lift them out of poverty.

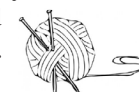
