My Dear Parish Family,

In terms of social media I must consider myself a person of no great importance. I have a mere 257 “friends” on Facebook, only 166 connections on LinkedIn and since I do not Tweet, I have 0 followers. Despite this, I would still contend that a considerable number of people in greater Cleveland know me. Few know me as well as they think they do, including many of whom I grew up with, here in this neighborhood.

One of the greatest challenges a person must come to terms with is how they will meet (or not) the expectations that other people have placed upon them. When we were young we had to learn what our parents thought a “good little boy or girl” was and tried our best to live up to that model (especially as Christmas drew near.) As we grew older there was always that desire to achieve goals so that we could earn the accolades of a proud parent – to fulfill our parents’ expectations for our success. Whether we succeeded or not, the tension between who we discover ourselves to be and what others thought we should be was always stressful.

In today’s gospel, Jesus is thrust into the very tension of which I mentioned. He returns to His hometown neighborhood, where He was allegedly “well known.” At first His reception is great, “*And all spoke highly of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth.*” Jesus is quick to point out that as impressed as they may be now, they do not really understand who He really is. He knows a fickle friend when He sees one. Jesus foretells how their smug familiarity with who they *think* He is will turn into contempt when He does not live up to their expectations. You see, these folks had their own very clear image of what the Messiah should look like and should do and frankly, Jesus did not measure up to their expectations. When He tries to expand this notion by calling to mind how His Father’s providence had been extended to those outside their “neighborhood” of Israel they try to kill Him. People don’t like it when the expectations they place on their heroes, as narrow as they might be, are not met.

The challenge of today’s Gospel is to ask ourselves if we have limited our relationship with our Lord Jesus by placing our own expectations on who He is or who we think He should be for us? If we limit our understanding of Jesus by restricting His impact to only that of what we expect of Him, haven’t we tried to put God in a box? Are we not attempting to worship a God made in the image of our own expectations? The only expectations, the only plan to which Jesus lived up to, was the Father’s plan for our salvation. For this reason we call Him not “friend” or “connection” but LORD.
