REFLECTION



Believing In Jesus

Last week our Gospel reading ended with Jesus telling the disciples, “You cannot serve God and mammon.” As Jesus was teaching the disciples to be prudent stewards of property and not to allow love of riches to interfere with discipleship, the Pharisees were also listening. The Pharisees, who loved money, heard all these things and sneered at him (Luke 16:14). Today’s parable of the rich man and Lazarus is part of this conversation. The parable is not simply about the proper use of riches; it is also about whether or not the Pharisees accept the teaching authority of those whom God has sent them: Moses, the prophets, and Jesus himself. As so often with the Gospel parables, the surprise is at the end – the dialogue between the rich man and Abraham. The rich man asks that Lazarus be allowed to convey a special warning to his five brothers who are still alive, the answer is that they have word of Scripture, and that is sufficient. The parable is about whether or not people will believe even if someone rises from the dead. Those who are unmoved by the message of Scripture will not be convinced by a miracle either, even by a Resurrection. If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets (the religious traditions), they would not heed a resurrected Lazarus.

By telling the parable Jesus is comparing the Pharisees to the rich man and warning them that by acting like the rich man they are abusing their wealth by ignoring the needs of the poor. In addition, like the rich man they are refusing to listen to Jesus himself. Such was Jesus’ point in telling the parable.

Covenant Responsibility

There is a theme in today’s readings that we do not like to face. Although the fundamental image of God is one of mercy and compassion, we cannot disregard the fact of judgment. The prophet Amos pronounces a woe against his own people. Abraham declares between us and you a great chasm is established. As we move closer to the end of the Liturgical Year, we are reminded of this judgment at the end of time. Judgment will be determined not primarily in terms of our obedience to law but in view of our fidelity to covenant commitment.

The readings are held up before us so we can compare our sense of covenant with that of the people portrayed within them. Unlike the people depicted in last Sunday’s readings, those in the readings today are not accused of dishonest behavior. They are not guilty of sins of commission. They are guilty of sins of omission, sins that flow from a covenant relationship with others. How do we measure up in this regard?
