We have discovered the treasure in the field; we have found the pearl of great price; we have been blessed with the Kingdom of God. What we have been given, we must now give to others. We can be assured that it will be with us as it was with Solomon. In giving we will lose nothing. In fact, we gain an abundance of blessings. All things work for good, and God is glorified in all. Such is the character of the Kingdom of God.

REFLECTION

Acquiring the Only Worthwhile Treasure The Kingdom of Heaven

Today we read three more comparisons that Jesus uses to help his disciples understand what he means by the *Kingdom of Heaven*. In both the parable of the buried treasure and the story of the pearl of great price, the person recognizes the value of his find and joyfully sells all he has in order to have that which is most valuable. Jesus' disciples must do the same. The third comparison is quite different from the other two parables. Just like the parable of the weeds and wheat of last week, the parable of the dragnet is used to teach that we are each accountable for our actions. The end for those who do good and those who do evil is not the same.

There is something about the Kingdom that resembles God's gift freely offered to us in today's first reading. Appearing to Solomon, God invites him to ask for whatever he would like. This demonstrates the generosity of God. The treasure we find is really a gift that is given. We need not work to attain it. The Kingdom is something God is doing. It is not a possession to be acquired. It is given to us by God. All we have to do is to accept it. In a sense the Kingdom of Heaven is ours for the asking. Unfortunately, we do not always recognize its value, and we do not ask for it.

Looking Ahead

From the 18th to the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When Jesus finished these parables, he went away from there. (Matthew 13:53)

This formula indicates, that we are coming to a new part in the Gospel of Matthew. The preceding Sundays centered on the mystery of the Kingdom of Heaven. The coming Sundays concern the community of disciples, the Church which will be built after the Lord's resurrection. In this ensemble, the Gospel readings focus on the topic of faith in Jesus, who multiplies the loaves, who comes to the aid of his own when their boat is tossed about by the storm, who answers a foreigner's prayer.

Eighteenth Sunday:

1st Reading – Isaiah 55:1-3

Come to the water.

Psalm – Psalm 145:8-9, 15-16, 17-18

You satisfy every desire.

2nd Reading – Romans 8:35, 37-39

What can separate us from the love of Christ?

Gospel – Matthew 14:13-21

They ate and were satisfied.



Nineteenth Sunday:

1st Reading – 1 Kings 19:19a, 11-13a

God was in the whispering sound.

Psalm – Psalm 85:9, 10, 11-12, 13-14

The Lord proclaims peace.

2nd Reading – Romans 9:1-5

Cut off for the sake of my people.

Gospel – Matthew 14:22-33

Let me come to you on the water.

Twentieth Sunday:

1st Reading – Isaiah 56:1, 6-7

I will bring all to my holy mountain.

Psalm – Psalm 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8

Let all nations praise you.

2nd Reading – Romans 11:13-15, 29-32

God's gifts are irrevocable.

Gospel – Matthew 15:21-28
