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

Hello,

We are deep into free food season, otherwise known as graduation open house season.

Speaking of celebrations, this week is a great week in the Diocese of Winona-Rochester. On Sunday, May 3rd, Matthew Wagner is being ordained to the transitional diaconate. This means that he will be like Deacon Chris, but as a step towards priesthood. God willing Matt will be ordained a priest next summer. This diaconate ordination will take place at the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Winona at 3 p.m.

Then on Friday, the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart (at the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart, having gone to major seminary at Sacred Heart Cathedral), Bishop John Quinn will ordain Deacons The Hong and Brian Mulligan to the priesthood. We get two new priests. As you know, we are in desperate need of priests. However, they won't be pastors right away. It will take a couple of years. So to start with, soon-to-be Father The will serve as the associate pastor at Pax Christi in Rochester and soon-to-be Father Brian will serve as the associate pastor at the Cathedral in Winona. So pray for these men as they end a seminary journey that began eight years ago and begin a life-long journey of priesthood.

This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of Corpus Christ, Latin for "the Body of Christ." How does one even begin to describe the awesomeness of the Eucharist? The Creator of the universe, of all the matter that we see around us, all the plants, animals, and people dared to become a baby boy. But at the Last Supper, He did one better - He transformed bread and wine into Himself. Unfortunately, it is possible and people do mistreat children. However, it is so much easier to "mistreat" what appears to be just a piece of unleavened bread or a drop of wine. And yet that is the risk our Savior takes. Why? Love and intimacy. Jesus, God, Creator of the universe wants to be united with us not just in spirit, but in body. He wants to become a part of us so that we can become a part of Him. God loves us more than we can imagine. This is why the Eucharist should never be taken lightly. Even though it can become routine, it should not ever become ordinary.

We are in Ordinary Time... Because the term ordinary in English most often means something that's not special or distinctive, many people think that Ordinary Time refers to parts of the calendar of the Catholic Church that are unimportant. Even though the season of Ordinary Time makes up most of the liturgical year in the Catholic Church, the fact that Ordinary Time refers to those periods that fall outside of the major liturgical seasons reinforces this impression. Yet Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting. WHY IS ORDINARY TIME CALLED ORDINARY? Ordinary Time is called "ordinary" not because it is common but simply because the weeks of Ordinary Time are numbered. The Latin word ordinalis, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word ordo, from which we get the English word order. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time in fact represent the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ. ...for Catholics, Ordinary Time is the part of the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. Among the treasures will be relics of St. Maria Goretti, St. Therese of Lisieux (the "Little Flower"), St. Francis of Assisi, St. Anthony of Padua, St. Thomas Aquinas, and St. Faustina Kowalska. In addition, there will also be present a portion of the veil of Our Lady, as well as one of the largest remaining pieces of the True Cross in the world. Sunday Bible Reflections with Dr. Scott Hahn

All of today's readings are set in the context of the Passover. The First Reading recalls the old covenant celebrated at Sinai following the first Passover and the Exodus.

In sprinkling the blood of the covenant on the Israelites, Moses was symbolizing God's desire in this covenant to make them His family, His "blood" relations.

Quoting Moses' words in today's Gospel, Jesus elevates and transforms this covenant symbol to an extraordinary reality. In the new covenant made in the blood of Christ, we truly become one with His body and blood.

The first covenant made with Moses and Israel at Sinai was but a shadow of this new and greater covenant made by Christ with all humankind in that upper room (see [Hebrews 10:1](#)).

The Passover that Jesus celebrates with His twelve apostles "actualizes," makes real, what could only be symbolized by Moses' sacrifice at the altar with twelve pillars. What Jesus does today is establish His Church as the new Israel, and His Eucharist as the new worship of the living God.

In offering himself to God through the Spirit, Jesus delivered Israel from the transgressions of the first covenant. And, as we hear in today's Epistle, by His blood He purified us and made us capable of true worship.

God does not want dead works or animal sacrifices. He wants our own flesh and blood, our own lives, consecrated to Him, offered as a living sacrifice. This is the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving that we sing of in today's Psalm. This is the Eucharist.

What we do in memory of Him is to pledge our lives to Him, to renew our promise to live by the words of His covenant, and to be His servants.

There is no other return we can offer to Him for the eternal inheritance He has won for us. So let us approach the altar, calling upon His name in thanksgiving, taking up the cup of salvation.
