From the Pastor's Desk

There is a deep spiritual lesson for all of us in today's gospel story. Like Bartimaeus, many in the world have been sitting by the roadside for years, not moving a foot toward their eternal destination. For many, their sole preoccupation seems to be to collect the paltry alms that this world would agree to drop in one's lap. Let's make sure that this isn't us. How often we human beings can be unaware of our spiritual blindness---we think everything in the garden is rosy and colorful when we see only the colors we want to see and are blind to the things that really matter. In the twenty centuries of our Christian history there have been some who have deliberately shut the eyes of their minds to the many calls to repentance which Jesus sent. This is a danger and a fatal mistake we can all avoid if we learn today's gospel message. For some among us today this may be Christ's last call. Will we be so utterly disinterested in our own eternal welfare as to ignore it? For all of us it is a call to put our house in order. As long as we have the breath of life in us, it is never too late to call out like Bartimaeus did, "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me!!"

Dear brothers and sisters,

For my first column I would like to talk about the Nicene Creed (or, more precisely, the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed) which contains the basic elements of our Catholic Faith. Many people desire to know more about the faith, but simply don't know where to begin. I hope to provide simple explanations here.

Before I address the individual articles of the Creed, I would like to briefly explain its history. The word "creed" comes from the Latin word *credo*, which means, "I believe." The name of this Creed is derived from the Ecumenical Councils which produced it: the Council of Nicea in 325 and the Council of Constantinople in 381. Why was it that these Councils were held? In the years preceding the Council of Nicea, there was a priest by the name of Arius who questioned the full divinity of Jesus (more on that in a future column). Suffice it to say that he sent the Church into turmoil. Many Christians (including bishops!) were denying that Jesus was fully God. This doctrinal debate caused great confusion and division among the faithful and so it was decided that a Council of bishops had to be convened to allay the confusion and heal the division. As a result, the bishops of the world gathered in the city of Nicea. Pertinent to the debate, they asked the question, "What was the faith that was taught to us by the Apostles?" Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the Council Fathers promulgated the Nicene Creed as to be definitely believed by all the Catholic faithful. It is important to note here that the Council Fathers were not inventing what we had to believe, but rather declaring the faith that had been handed down since the time of the Apostles.

The controversy did not end there, however, and the Church found it expedient to hold another Council in 381, this time in Constantinople. At this Council, the Nicene Creed was confirmed and expanded (the original Nicene Creed ended with "We believe in the Holy Spirit."). This Creed was soon added to the liturgy so as to ensure that all of the Catholic faithful would profess and believe the truths handed on to us from Christ and his Apostles.

I hope this provides a helpful primer on the fascinating history surrounding the Creed. In my next column I will explain the first article in detail.

Important information to know before voting on these measures

Four measures will appear on the North Dakota ballot on November 6, 2018.

Measure No. 1 is a constitutional amendment that would establish new mandates on private and public persons related to attempts to influence government. While well-intentioned, Measure 1 is poorly drafted, cannot be easily fixed, and is a threat to the mission of churches and charities. Among its many problems, it would force churches to divulge the private information its members or contributors as the “price” for speaking on a public issue. The North Dakota Catholic Conference urges a **NO vote on Measure 1**.

Measure 2 is constitutional amendment to state that “only a citizen” of the United States is a qualified elector, instead of the current provision that states “every citizen” of the United States is a qualified elector. The North Dakota Catholic Conference has no position on Measure 2. Catholics should use their informed prudential judgment.

Measure 3 is a statutory measure to legalize recreational marijuana. It removes practically every law concerning marijuana and has no limits how much or where a person could grow, sell, or use marijuana. It is a threat to health, safety, and the common good. The North Dakota Catholic Conference urges a **NO vote on Measure 3**.

Measure 4 is a statutory measure requiring the Department of Transportation to issue red personalized vehicle plates to volunteer emergency responders. The North Dakota Catholic Conference has no position on Measure 4. Catholics should use their informed prudential judgment.

Providing social and community services to those in need, including those with disabilities, mental illness, and addictions?

Reforming the criminal justice system so that it focuses on restoration, rehabilitation, prevention, and opportunity? Providing safe havens for properly-vetted refugees, regardless of race, nationality, or religious affiliation?

The Economy

Ensuring a just wage, economic initiative, and the right of workers to form associations to collectively represent their interests?

Policies to foster family farms, rural communities, good stewardship of natural resources, and the right of local communities to regulate for the common good?
