Reconciliation will be offered Saturday, May 16 from 3:30-4:40pm: Fr. Homer Blubaugh will be hearing confessions. As we ease back into the celebration of the sacrament, please follow these guidelines:

- Appointments must be made. Time slots from 3:30-4pm will be for our older folk and those at high risk. All others may make an appointment from 4-4:30pm. Please call Sandy Mickley at 740-507-9569 to schedule an appointment.
- Please take your temperature before coming and stay at home if you do not feel well. Confessions will be in the Community Center. Plan to arrive 5 minutes early and to wear a face mask or other covering over your nose and mouth.
- You will enter through a glass lobby door with a Knight there to monitor those going in and out so as not to disrupt one's confession. Do not touch doors, walls, etc. if possible. An area will be designated to stand. Confessions will not be face-to-face. Father will wear a mask and face away to avoid exposure and for your anonymity.
- Please limit your confession to 5 minutes. This is NOT a time for pastoral counseling. Come and confess your sins, receive penance & absolution, and go home to do your penance. An Act of Contrition will be posted for you to read.

Thanks for your cooperation. We will get through these difficult times. God bless you all.

Catechism of the Catholic Church 653: The truth of Jesus’ divinity is confirmed by his Resurrection. He had said: “When you have lifted up the Son of man, then you will know that I am he.” The Resurrection of the crucified one shows that he was truly “I Am,” the Son of God and God himself. So St. Paul could declare to the Jews: “What God promised to the fathers, this he has fulfilled to us their children by raising Jesus; as also it is written in the second psalm, ‘You are my Son, today I have begotten you.’” Christ’s Resurrection is closely linked to the Incarnation of God’s Son and is its fulfillment in accordance with God’s plan.
