Dear Community Members,

This coming Sunday is our Lenten midpoint, Laetare Sunday. This is one of the two Sundays on which the priest may wear rose vestments; the other being Gaudete Sunday in mid-Advent. This Sunday, flowers may be on the altar and the organ may be played. “But, Father, the organ has been played for the last three Sundays.” Well, yes, I know. There is a provision for the organ to play solely to accompany voices, be they in the choir or in the congregation. Not to diminish our good choir in the least, but, if we had more voices (hint, hint), the choir could, in effect, “serve” as the organ. But, because we’re still relatively new to congregational singing, and because the church is far bigger than we are at the moment, the organ is a great help.

That said, I was very impressed at the size of our congregation last Sunday at the 11AM Mass. The gospel side actually looked rather full. We had a total of 158. According to my figures, that is now our high point – a record! The closest we came to that was last January 18, when there were 142. For the most part, since last fall, our numbers have been hovering around 120 to 130 on average – a great improvement over a year ago when, on March 2, we had 70, and our average was 100 to 110. Take my word for it, there’s nothing better for a community than growth.

St. Patrick seats more than the cathedral. Our comfortable seating capacity is 450 to 480. Yet, without too much trouble, 500 could fit. Wouldn’t it be wonderful if the 7AM matched the present 11AM level and the present 11AM level doubled, or even more than doubled? Let’s all think about that. I try never to miss an opportunity to invite people I meet at Kroger, Sam’s Club, at a gas station, anywhere, to come to Mass on Sunday. Sometimes it works. What if we all did that? I tell you, I’d like nothing better than to have to add a Mass or two on Sundays.

Last Sunday’s Pot-Luck was a great and tasty success. Our hearty thanks must go to the Siebenmorgen and the (two) Elsinger families. I was so pleased to see our families with children at the brunch. As I mentioned last week, it was wonderful to see all of those kids playing together. So, let’s all catch our breath this Sunday in order to make the second half of Lent as fruitful as possible, my children and my friends.
