Dear Community Members,

Since I have arrived here, I have learned a lot about how to run this community: where things are, what the schedule is, what has to be done, who does what and what I do myself. I was surprised so many things have gone wrong since Fr. Magiera left. Yet many of them do not seem to be related to his absence. He has been gone about a week now.

I, nevertheless, can only feel satisfaction about this whole week because these problems are over with or in some cases I have come up with solutions to the problems. You will probably notice that at least one thing is better: the church should be a little cooler. I have a few more major projects and some other things may arise, but I think things will be better from having gone through this week, and perhaps it will be better for Fr. Magiera when he gets back.

They don't train you in seminary for a lot of things like these, because priests face a lot of diverse problems and a priest can always seek someone else to take care of the situation. But I never envisioned that our fraternity priests would have to take care of so many things. The list which has to be taken care of is different at each apostolate at which I have worked. One of the main reasons that we have to do so many different things is that our budgets are small and there are less parish activities to do during the week because members have to travel so far that most parishioners do not come during the week.

The seminary trained us for things more essential to serving as a priest and a lot of exercises prepared us to serve in the traditional liturgy. We came together three or four times a day to pray the office and once for mass. We almost always had meditation, and often the rosary, or the Stations of the Cross or adoration. We had retreats, spiritual conferences and had to have a spiritual director. The recitation, chanting of the office and mass, took considerable time, but it trained us to know the words, be educated by the teaching and to know how, what to pray and just to pray. Singing the office and the mass helped me to commit many of the melodies and words to memory.

Community meals, sports and events were also part of the seminary experience. We also had to work around the seminary and help out with meals. Fr. Magiera and I were often assigned to read for the community at meals. I was placed in charge of computers at the seminary, and created a 'dial up' internet, then moved to satellite and finally 'DSL'. Which part have I left out of our seminary training? I hope that you have noticed that Fr. Magiera and I have had a considerable amount of *something else* at the seminary.
