Dear Community Members,

The heat of the summer is diminishing but with it activities in our community are increasing. First Saturday altar boy practices are beginning again. Music for little ones also starts up. And the schola which has been going through the summer is starting a program for the introduction of new talent. We are looking at the feasibility of starting some other groups within our community as well and when Fr. Magiera we should be able to announce these new activities.

By and large all activities in this chaplaincy strengthen it. The last thing to go at a chaplaincy is the Mass itself. And so for a chaplaincy to end, the activities have to be end first. So the more activities we have the more the chaplaincy is strengthened, because other activities have to fall away first before the mass falls away. I hope that you all can in some ways involve yourself in the community and let us pray that there are enough activities that all can find a way to fit into this chaplaincy.

Now in describing our seminary training, I left out considerable amount of *something else* which I hope that you have notice that Fr. Magiera and I did. And that is training in theology which both gives us understanding and is useful for our salvation. Our seminary training stood out particularly in that it helped to root our catechism in divine revelation itself. This is very important today when many Catholics are presenting opinions as being part of our faith which are not, presenting teaching as being authoritative, citing the spirit of Vatican II when more accurately it is the spirit of discontinuity, discontinuity with the tradition. Consider also that today there is a large group of people in Catholic teaching positions who want to feed their families and give their spouse nice things. They have to appeal to a much broader base of Catholics in order to feed their families. So you can imagine how they construct their views in order not to get in trouble with spirit of discontinuity and try to distant themselves from tradition.

The fraternity seminary by the study of Theology and Philosophy according to the method and teaching of St. Thomas Aquinas is particularly suited to the understanding of the Faith in this time of a lack of authoritative teaching in the church and instead many things are said that are clearly not Catholic teaching at all but only confusing. St. Thomas Aquinas teaches wisdom not just so that we can practice the faith in a convent or a catholic society, but in a society that is opposed faith and still finds time to attack the traditional church almost no where exists.
