Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

Following Jesus is not an easy thing to do and often requires sacrifice and discipline. This is because we are heirs to a fallen human nature due to Original Sin. The effect of this initial rejection of our creaturely status has twisted our interior desires so that they have become disordered, meaning, that they no longer direct us to what is in keeping with God’s will for us. From this interior misalignment arises our tendency towards many of the particular sins that we commit. Saint Augustine held that sin is not always simply a deliberate choice of an evil over a good, but the choice of a lesser good over a greater good when charity, prudence, or Christian duty demand a different choice. For example, we might at times rather take a nap or watch television than pray, or attend a sporting event instead of going to Mass on Sunday. In themselves, naps, television, sports, recreation, etc. are not evil, but when chosen over a greater good or obligatory duty, they have the effect of moving us away from God – we condition ourselves to do what we want, rather than what we should. Essentially, rather than let God’s will (which is always directed to what is truly best for us) govern our lives, we insist on being in control.

Overcoming these disordered tendencies in our lives requires discipline, acting over and against what we would rather do. We are already very familiar with this as regards our physical bodies. If we want to lose weight, we watch what we eat and exercise more. Well, there is a corollary in the spiritual life – from time to time, acting over and against our desires for things that are good, disciplines us and strengthens our desire for spiritual good. It reminds us that, as good as created things are, they cannot ultimately satisfy the deepest longing of our heart, that there is a higher and greater good for which we long – God. Further, this voluntary sacrifice strengthens the resolve of our will. Because, if I can say no to something I am rightly allowed to do or partake of, then when faced with temptation, I will better be able to say no to it, having gained greater mastery over what I choose to do and not to do. This spiritual practice of self-denial is what we call fasting or abstinence. Abstinence is a virtue (good habit) that inclines a person to moderate their intake of food, drink, or other good things in order to derive some spiritual benefit. There is great precedent for this practice both in Scripture and in tradition. The Old Testament is filled with proscriptions against eating certain kinds of food or how those foods were to be eaten. There are numerous examples of great Biblical figures such as Moses, Elijah, David, John the Baptist, and Jesus Himself, who fasted and abstained from food and drink.

Today, when we think of fasting and abstinence, we usually associate it with the season of Lent, as in not eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and the other Fridays of Lent, and giving something up for those 40 days. For example, we might choose to give up television, relinquish the use of social media, skip desserts, abstain from alcohol, forgo chocolate, or give up some other good thing or activity (note – it doesn’t count as fasting if you are giving up something that you are not supposed to do anyway. You cannot fast from saying uncharitable things, because fasting must be the giving up of a licit good).

Ash Wednesday is February 17th, and the Church invites all Catholics to observe a day of fasting (1 regular meal and 2 much smaller meals that collectively are less than a regular meal, with no eating between meals) and abstinence from meat.

Also, even though we are limited due to the pandemic about what we can gather people together to do, there are some added spiritual opportunities that will be available this Lent. First, 6:30 am confessions and 7:15 am Mass will return Monday through Friday. Stations of the Cross will be prayed each Friday at 5:10 pm. There are also numerous faith formation opportunities available through the parish’s subscription to < formed.org >.

Ash Wednesday is only days away! Welcome Lent! Traditionally, as Catholics, prayer, fasting, and alms-giving quickly come to mind! Each of these can enrich our faith and strengthen our discipleship. We may pray more than usual or with a different focus. We may do more sacred reading. We may eat smaller or fewer meals, or we may give up a favorite food or drink. Also, we may give more of our resources (money, time, ...) to special works of mercy during Lent.

As you prepare for the Lenten season, here are some reflection questions for your consideration.

- How do you prepare for Lent?
- What have you done in past years to prepare?
- What do you think should happen during this time?
- What needs to happen internally so that your practice may manifest with more integrity and intentionality?
- How can you be more open to God's desires?
- How can you better use the gifts that God has given you?

It's good to have a plan for doing, as well as a plan for being. Be prepared for those plans to change as you become more attentive to God's voice.

Fast & Abstinence - Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17 & Good Friday, April 2 are days of abstinence from meat and also days of fast (that is, limited to a single full meal). The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. The law of fasting binds all Catholics from their 18th birthday until their 59th birthday (Canons 97 and 1252).

Additional Downtown Ash Wednesday Masses:

St. Peter's Church (E. 17th St. & Superior Ave.): Mass with the distribution of ashes will begin at 12:00 Noon with Bishop Roger Gries, OSB, presiding.

Conversion of St. Paul Shrine (E. 40th St. & Euclid Ave.): Capuchin Friars will be available for confession beginning at 11:00 am. Mass with the distribution of ashes will follow at 12 noon.

Sunday Evening Mass at St. Peter: St. Peter's Church (E. 17th St. & Superior Ave.), in conjunction with the Newman Ministry of Cleveland State University, will offer a weekly 7:00 pm Sunday evening Mass beginning on February 21st.
