Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

Have you ever wondered to yourself – What am I supposed to do with my life? Probably most of us have mused on that question at one point or another. The Saint whom the Church celebrates on March 3 – Saint Katharine Drexel – wondered about this very same thing in her own life, and received her answer through a rather dramatic challenge.

Katharine was born to a very prominent family in Philadelphia on November 26th 1858. Her father was a banker, and one of the wealthiest men in America. Her mother died just after her birth and so she never really knew her. Katharine’s father and step-mother set a wonderful example of faith for their children – there was a chapel in the family home, to which her father went to pray every day after work; several times a week, her parents would open their house to feed to poor; and Katharine herself would teach catechism classes during the summer to the children of the workers on her family’s summer estate. One of the truths that the Drexels impressed upon their children was the realization that their vast wealth did not belong to them, but that it had been entrusted to them by God, and as such, they were called to be good stewards of it – using it to serve others.

When Katherine was in her early 20’s she lost in short order, both her father and her step-mother, leaving her and her sisters to inherit a massive fortune. She was not entirely sure what to do with so much money, but the lessons that her parents had instilled in her concerning the purpose of wealth stuck with her. Katharine had become aware of the plight of Native Americans and African Americans during her extensive travels around the country, and, after she was visited by some missionaries who were working with these groups of people, she made significant contributions to support their missionary efforts. But, she was still struggling to find her purpose in life. So she took a trip to Europe, and near the end of her time there, she had an audience with Pope Leo XIII. She shared with the Holy Father the plight of the Native Americans and African Americans in the United States, and begged him to find some missionary order to send to minister to their needs. To which the Pope replied: “Why don’t you do something about it”, meaning, why don’t you be that missionary. Pope Leo’s words cut her very deeply, and as she left the audience she found herself sobbing. His challenge had stirred up the question of religious life in her heart. After some discernment, in 1891 Katherine Drexel founded the “Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored People.” As the name suggests, this order would be dedicated to our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, and serving those who were most neglected in society. Mother Drexel would spend the rest of her life exhausting herself and her fortune in the service of others. By the end of her life, she had over 500 sisters teaching in over 60 schools and missions throughout the country, including Xavier University (the first institution of higher learning for African Americans in the United States). Saint Katharine Drexel died in 1955 at the age of 96.

Mother Drexel’s life reminds us that we should all strive to be aware of the needs that are right in front of our nose. Perhaps these needs are right in front of our nose because God’s is inviting us to do something about it. Instead of saying, “someone should really do something about this,” we might instead remember to words of Pope Leo XIII – “Why don’t you do something about it.”

**Faith Enrichment Opportunities****Second Sunday of Lent**

Background: This Sunday's Gospel recounts the last of three successive episodes that center on Jesus as God's beloved Son: his baptism, temptation, and transfiguration. Having successfully met the temptations to misunderstand what that calling might mean, Jesus today hears God reaffirm for the disciples that they must "listen to him." The road of discipleship leads to an awareness of how we are already being transfigured if we follow Jesus.

Discussion Questions

1. When did Jesus stop being merely your teacher and become also your savior and Lord?
2. When have you seen his power transfigure other people? How has faith transformed them?
3. What do you want this Lent to transfigure in you?
4. How good are you at bringing what you seen on the mountaintop with you down into the plain of ordinary life?



Practice: His right hand is preparing to make the sign of the cross in the way that Eastern Christians use, with three fingers joined to profess the Trinity and two joined to profess that he is both divine and human. His left hand is holding the Gospel out to you. Each day meditate upon this image; then pray for the catechumens, candidates, and yourself. Then, pray Psalm 25, 4-10 - *Make known to me your ways, LORD; teach me your paths. Guide me by your fidelity and teach me, for you are God my savior, for you I wait all the day long. Remember your compassion and your mercy, O LORD, for they are ages old. Remember no more the sins of my youth; remember me according to your mercy, because of your goodness, LORD. Good and upright is the LORD, therefore he shows sinners the way, He guides the humble in righteousness, and teaches the humble his way. All the paths of the LORD are mercy and truth toward those who honor his covenant and decrees.* ~Team RCIA

is next weekend. The countries in Central and Eastern Europe have faced a century of hardship. They have been oppressed by radical communism, horrendous crimes against humanity, and revolutionary, civil, and world wars. Under communism, religion and religious practices were openly persecuted and atheism was enforced. Control of every aspect of life was taken over by totalitarian governments and the communist party, and civil society and the economy were deconstructed. Central and Eastern European countries have been working to rebuild their political structures, social welfare, economies, along with their religious life.

The USCCB Subcommittee on Aid to the Church in Central and Eastern Europe funds projects in 28 countries to build the pastoral capacity of the Church and to rebuild and restore the Faith in these countries. The funds raised in the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe are used to support the renewal of vital aspects of the Church life: seminaries, youth ministry, social service programs, pastoral centers, church construction and renovation, and Catholic communications projects.


