Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

Just because some course of action seems to be good, does that means that it is God’s will? The Saint whom the Church celebrates this Thursday had to confront this very question in her own life.

Saint Frances was born in Rome in 1384, to a noble and wealthy family. She was a quiet, yet strong willed, and pious girl. At the age of 11, she decided that she was going to be a nun, her father, however, had already promised her in marriage to the son of another prominent Roman family. Despite this, Frances was determined to enter religious life and so she prayed and asked God to prevent the marriage from taking place. Her confessor, on the other hand, pushed back against her desires with a rather challenging question: “Are you crying because you want to do God’s will, or because you want God to do your will?” And so, she consented to marry Lorenzo Ponziani, himself a good man, who actually cared very deeply for Frances.

Lorenzo served as the commander of the papal armies, which meant that he would be away for extended periods fighting in various battles. Frances found the demands of her new station in life very challenging; she who wished to live an austere penitential life, was now thrust into parties and entertainment. She felt very much alone, until one day she discovered that her sister-in-law also felt as she did. The two of them worked out a way to live a life devoted to God in the midst of their vocations to married life and family obligations. First, they made the choice to give themselves over joyfully to the obligations of family life. The two of them also set up a secret chapel in one of the towers of the family estate where they would go to pray. They would attend Mass together and visit hospitals and prisons. This raised the eyebrows of other members of their families, because it was considered unfashionable for noble women to be seen working with the poor. The family appealed to Lorenzo to get his wife to stop this foolishness, but he refused to curtail her charity.

Frances would go on to have three children with her husband, one of whom she would lose to plague. But, when disease and famine struck Rome, she made sure that no one who came begging alms was turned away. Eventually, she did win over her family to her desire to serve Christ in others, especially the poor. Frances sold her jewels and expensive clothing in order to better care for the poor. There also arose at this time a civil war, as three men were all claiming to be Pope (each with his own army). This civil war took its toll, and Frances opened up her home as a makeshift hospital and shelter for the homeless. Her husband was injured in the conflicts, and so he returned home, where Frances took care of him for seven years until his death. During this time, she also founded a society of women dedicated to serving the poor, and upon her husband’s death, she came to live the remainder of her life with this society. Saint Frances of Rome died four years later, in 1440. Her feast day is March 9th.

Saint Frances was a woman who was able to find a way to do God’s will in the midst of the circumstances in which she found herself. After some soul searching, she realized that God’s will can be done anywhere, if we are willing to let go of our own stubbornness of will and surrender to His.

## Faith Enrichment Opportunities

### Third Sunday of Lent – First Scrutiny

**Background:** It is so easy to let compromise into our lives, to slowly abandon our ideals as we make accommodations to what seems “sensible.” For example, people need animals to offer in the Temple sacrifices; why not set up a market along the side of the building? Everybody wins!

Yet Jesus demands “zeal,” a wholehearted dedication to God’s call. For in his own person, indeed, in his own body, he is the new and living dwelling – place of God among humanity – and so are we! What spring housecleaning is needed before Easter in our Temple?

#### Discussion Questions

1. What do you want Jesus to drive out from you and your life?
2. How have you betrayed our relationship with Jesus by letting other “gods” into your heart and life?
3. What stumbling blocks in yourself or in society keep God’s power from working through you?
4. What keeps you from hearing the voices of the poor, the vulnerable, the marginalized?

**Practice:** Where have you compromised in life? In your work, your marriage, your family life, your friendships? Pick one area, and invite to a serious, sincere, and humble conversation a person who might help you change into a more authentic person.

is this weekend. The countries in Central and Eastern Europe have faced a century of hardship. They have been oppressed by radical communism, horrendous crimes against humanity, and revolutionary, civil, and world wars. Under communism, religion and religious practices were openly persecuted and atheism was enforced. Control of every aspect of life was taken over by totalitarian governments and the communist party, and civil society and the economy were deconstructed. Central and Eastern European countries have been working to rebuild their political structures, social welfare, economies, along with their religious life.

The USCCB Subcommittee on Aid to the Church in Central and Eastern Europe funds projects in 28 countries to build the pastoral capacity of the Church and to rebuild and restore the Faith in these countries. The funds raised in the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe are used to support the renewal of vital aspects of the Church life: seminaries, youth ministry, social service programs, pastoral centers, church construction and renovation, and Catholic communications projects.

**#1 Life and dignity of the Human Person** - human life is sacred and the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society.

Priest: The Lord be with you.

### PENITENTIAL ACT

I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do,

*(And, striking their breast, all say:)*

through my fault, through my fault,

through my most grievous fault; *(Then they continue:)*

therefore I ask blessed Mary ever-Virgin, all the Angels and Saints, and you, my brothers and sisters, to pray for me to the Lord our God.

### GLORY TO GOD

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

### CREED

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages.

God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, *(All bow)* and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the

Virgin Mary, and became man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures.

He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.

I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.





This gift of a plenary indulgence extends particularly to the elderly, the sick, the dying, and all those who, for legitimate reasons, are unable to leave their homes, if, detached from all sin and with the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the usual conditions, recite an act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, comfort of the sick and patron of a good death, offering with confidence to God the pains and trials of their life.
