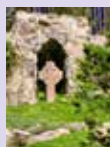

Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

We are currently making our way through this year in which the Church is inviting us to reflect upon the life and example of that quiet, humble, faithful, and holy man, Saint Joseph. He was a man who was willing to do whatever God asked of him, making sacrifices for the sake of Our Lord and the Blessed Virgin Mary, and serving as the protector of the Holy Family. In calling this year of Saint Joseph, Pope Francis' hope was that *"every member of the faithful, following his example, may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of God's will."* The Holy Father further noted that *"each of us can discover in Joseph – the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence – an intercessor, a support, and a guide in times of trouble."*

During this holy year in honor of Saint Joseph, the Church has made a plenary indulgence available to all who satisfy the usual conditions (confession, eucharist, prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father, a spirit of detachment from sin, and the intention to gain the indulgence for one's self or someone in purgatory), as well as performed one of the prescribed works. *"An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints. An indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin"* (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1471).

The opportunities to obtain the plenary indulgence are as follows:

- Meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord's Prayer, or take part in a spiritual retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph
- Following St. Joseph's example, perform a spiritual or corporal work of mercy
- Recite the Holy Rosary with your family or your fiancé
- Entrust your daily activity to the protection of St. Joseph
- Pray through the intercession of St. Joseph that those seeking work can find dignifying work
- Recite the Litany of St. Joseph for Christians who suffer all forms of persecution
- Recite any prayer or act of piety legitimately approved in honor of St. Joseph, in particular on March 19, May 1, on the 19th of any month, and every Wednesday

This gift of a plenary indulgence extends particularly to the elderly, the sick, the dying, and all those who, for legitimate reasons, are unable to leave their homes, if, detached from all sin and with the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the usual conditions, recite an act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, comfort of the sick and patron of a good death, offering with confidence to God the pains and trials of their life.

This coming Friday is March 19th – the Solemnity of Saint Joseph – and because it ranks among the solemnities of the Church, the law dispenses all Catholic for penance on that day. This means that not only can you eat meat, but you can partake of whatever you have opted to fast from during Lent. It also affords us the opportunity to obtain a plenary indulgence under the conditions above. To that end, following the Noon Mass (at approximately 12:30 pm) on Friday, 19 March 2021, devotion will be honored to St. Joseph. We will gather at his Statue in the Mary Transept following the Mass and offer prayers. Please feel free to join us.

**FAITH ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES****Fourth Sunday of Lent – Second Scrutiny**

Background: It is easy to live in guilt or shame, because those emotions put the focus on ourselves and our actions. We sometimes hesitate to accept God's grace and mercy because their focus is on God and the divine actions. Yet the only way to live in the light is to surrender in trust to God's love.

Discussion Questions

1. How have you been surprised at God's grace at work within you and your life?
2. What are you still afraid to admit about yourself? What false image are you trying to create for yourself?
3. Jesus was lifted up to heal the harm of our destructive words and ways. What is he trying to heal within you today?
4. What grace does Jesus want you to bring to our world or our Church today?

Practice: The cross is perhaps the most ancient Christian symbol; the crucifix came later. In many places we encounter gory and dramatic versions of Christ's suffering there, versions sometimes intended to evoke empathy, pity, but also guilt. These have their place, but another ancient tradition is to portray Christ as the victor on the cross, lifted up to lead us back to the Father. Examine online the different types of crosses and crucifixes, and in your prayer contemplate those that speak most to you at this time in your life.

Shrugging, do I retreat into facile cliches, the popular but false wisdom of what 'we all know.'? LENT 2021

DEVOTIONS TO ST. JOSEPH will be held after the 12:00 pm Mass on Friday, Mar. 19, the feast of the Solemnity of St. Joseph.

ABSTINENCE - The Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. **The Solemnity of Saint Joseph falls on a Friday. As a solemnity, the requirement to abstain from meat is dispensed for that day.**

THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS will be prayed each Friday of Lent at 5:10 pm and will be live streamed on the Diocesan website:

I confess to almighty God and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do,

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages.

God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, *(All bow)* and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures.

He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.

I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins

and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Congregational singing is discouraged to mitigate spread of virus.

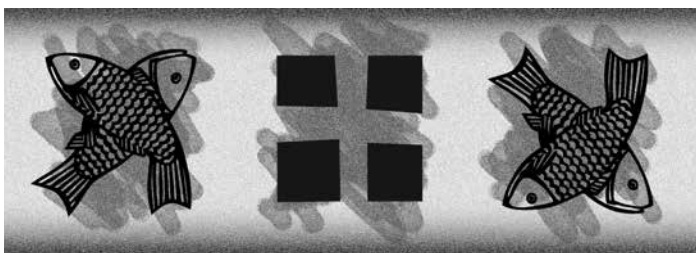
If you pick up a bulletin, take it with you.

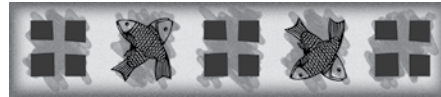

This gift of a plenary indulgence extends particularly to the elderly, the sick, the dying, and all those who, for legitimate reasons, are unable to leave their homes, if, detached from all sin and with the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the usual conditions, recite an act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, comfort of the sick and patron of a good death, offering with confidence to God the pains and trials of their life.

SOLEMNITY OF ST. JOSEPH (March 19) falls on a Friday this year. As a solemnity, the requirement to abstain from meat on Friday within the season of Lent is dispensed for that day (see canon 1251). If you chose to make use of this special dispensation, the faithful are encouraged to choose another day during the week of March 15-20 to abstain from meat as part of their Lenten observances. On the solemnity of Saint Joseph, it is the custom in some places to bless bread, pastries, and other food, and give a large portion of it to the poor. One of the prescribed works for the indulgence from the link above includes: *Pray any lawfully approved prayer or act of piety in honor of Saint Joseph, for example "To you oh blessed Joseph," especially on: March 19th (Solemnity of St. Joseph).*
