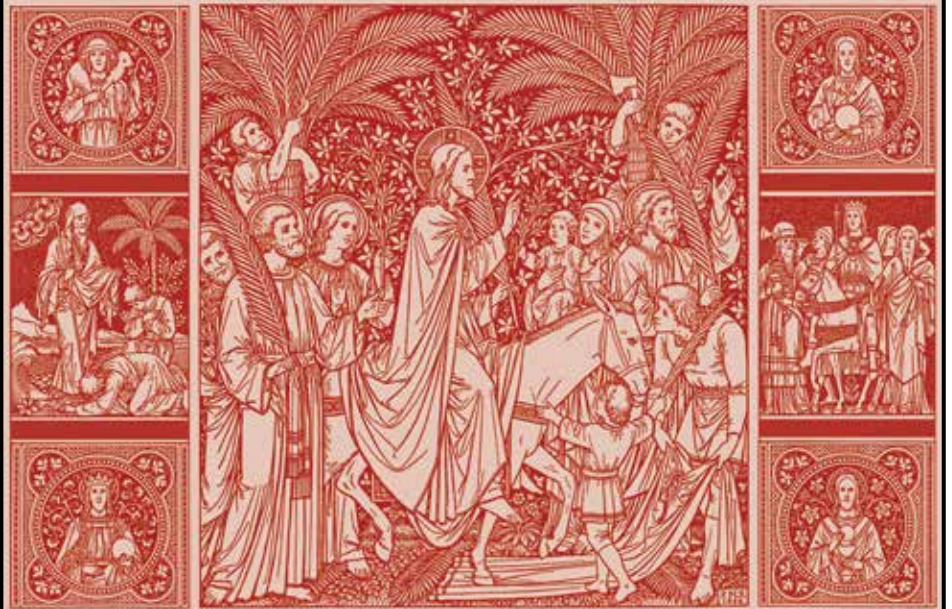

Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

This coming week is Holy Week, the most solemn and sacred week of the Church's liturgical year. It is during this week that we celebrate those mysteries which are central to the redemption of the human race. Because of the sanctity of this week, there are no Saint's feast days that fall during this time, and thus, I would like to briefly take a look at what each day this week commemorates for us.

Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week, as the Church celebrates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. He enters the city as a king who has come, once and for all, to establish the reign of God. His entrance into the holy city takes place amid throngs of people waving palm branches before him, and greeting him with 'hosannas' (save us now). Some of those very same voices that were extolling his entrance into Jerusalem, would soon turn into yells, calling for his crucifixion, when He does not conform to their expectations.

On **Holy Thursday**, the Church will celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper, which commemorates three things: institution of the Eucharist, the institution of the ministerial priesthood, and Jesus' command that His disciples love one another in the way that He loves them. This command of fraternal charity is expressed during the liturgy as the celebrant, in imitation of Jesus, washes the feet of some of those present.

During the celebration of the Lord's Passion on **Good Friday**, we journey with the Lord during his final hours from the agony in the garden, through his trial, torture, crucifixion, and finally His being placed in the tomb. This day commemorates the depth of God's love for us in His willingness to take upon himself all of human brokenness and sin, including death itself. During this liturgy, the cross holds a special place of prominence, and is presented to those in attendance, so that they might venerate the instrument upon which Jesus Christ redeemed the world. Traditionally no sacraments are celebrated on this day with the exception of Penance and Anointing of the Sick.

Finally, once the sun has set on **Holy Saturday** night, we come to the pivotal event in Salvation History, the event upon which the hope and joy of the human race depends – the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. It definitively recalls that God's love for us is more powerful than our sins, and even more powerful than death itself. This most important celebration of the entire liturgical year continues through

Easter Sunday. In this mystery, Jesus shows us in His own person, what He has won for us and what will happen to each of us someday, if we are willing to become His disciples.

Hopefully you will be able to join us for the celebrations over the days to come. All of the liturgical celebrations will be open for in person participation, as well as live-streamed.

Faith Enrichment Opportunities

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

Background: Christian liturgy is not a play reenacting past events but a living celebration of the inner meaning of those events so that it comes alive in us today. As the oldest Palm Sunday hymn says: "To you before your passion they sang their hymns of praise. To you, now high exalted, our melody we raise."

Discussion Questions

1. Why are you happy to join in welcoming Christ today?
2. What is Christ asking you to let him make use of as he proclaims today the coming of God's kingdom/reign?
3. What can you do to help others experience the coming of Christ with joy? How will you share the message of Jesus, not as judgment, but as Good News?
4. Jesus is "King of Israel and David's royal Son." But antisemitism is a persistent Christian sin. Where have you encountered it? What will you resolve to do next time?

Practice: Placing the palms with the cross or crucifix at home is an old custom — as is weaving them into crosses. Allow this custom to help you keep in mind during prayer this week that both dying and rising are part of the Paschal mystery.

WE ARE CALLED - CRS Rice Bowl - This Lenten season, our faith community, and more than 12,000 Catholic communities across the United States participated in a Lenten journey with CRS Rice Bowl.

This weekend, Palm Sunday, is the time to return your Rice Bowl. Through CRS Rice Bowl, we encounter those living in conditions of poverty around the world, and have the opportunity to practice the corporal and spiritual works of mercy through our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. During the 40 days of Lent, we will reflect on how hunger and malnutrition affect our human family, and on the need to take action to end this global injustice.

Serving the Suffering Christ - As we enter Holy Week and celebrate Palm Sunday, let's reflect on how our Lord suffered from our indifference: those who proclaimed him king of Jerusalem were the same who called to crucify him. We recognize that we are all one human family. Are we contributing to the suffering of our sisters and brothers with our indifference to their realities? 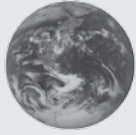
THE CATHEDRAL CHARITABLE ASSISTANCE FUND - Did you know that the Cathedral rectory is asked daily for assistance in filling in some of the gaps in the social service sector? Donations from you make it possible to give this assistance. We are the rare place to give aid to travelers stranded by extreme circumstances. Help with rent/utilities, in obtaining documentation necessary for work, or for obtaining prescriptions is also sometimes given. These acts of charity, as well as helping people find the social service agency best equipped to assist their need, are performed daily here at the Cathedral. When you give to the "Offerings for the Poor" collection boxes in the Cathedral, you are donating to the Cathedral's Charitable Assistance Fund, which is used to assist the needy that come to us for help. Christians, we believe that the earth is entrusted to our faithful stewardship. We are not its owners, but its caretakers on behalf of God. How can I be a good steward?

How can we recycle more & better in 2021? Here are some tips:

Start by participating. Half of what American households throw away is recyclable. Check locally to know what's accepted in your curbside recycling, what day it's picked up, or find a nearby drop-off site.

Know what to throw. Recycling is a global issue that requires local solutions. Many communities accept different materials. Visit your local city website to learn what materials are and are not accepted.

Know what not to throw. The No List. Plastic bags, clothing, food and liquid, garden hoses, electrical cords, Styrofoam, needles, and yard waste do not belong in curbside recycling.

Twin the bin. Make it easy for anyone in your house to recycle – just as easy as it is to throw something away. Locate your in-home recycling bin next to your trash can. For extra credit, twin the bin in your kitchens, bathrooms, and laundry room. Most of a home's recyclables originate in these three rooms.

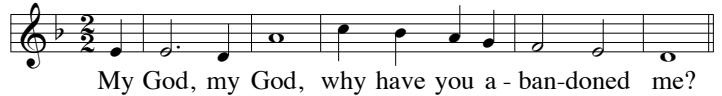

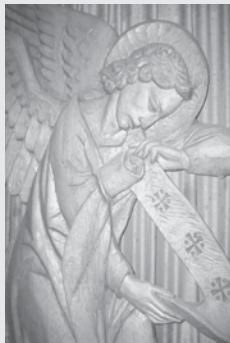
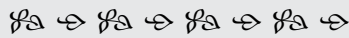

FAST & ABSTINENCE - Good Friday, April 2, is a day of abstinence from meat and also days of fast (that is, limited to a single full meal). The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. The law of fasting binds all Catholics from their 18th birthday until their 59th birthday (Canons 97 and 1252).

Holy Hour of Reparation - We may wonder what we can do to help establish justice, and bring healing to those affected by corruption in the Church. One thing that we can do, is to pray for the Church, and all those affected. On the first Monday of the month, April 5, the Cathedral will have a **Holy Hour of Reparation and Healing**, from approximately 5:45-6:45 pm. It will provide an opportunity for prayer before the Blessed Sacrament and conclude with prayers of reparation.



YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH - During this Year of Saint Joseph, the Church has made a plenary indulgence available to all the faithful who satisfy the usual conditions (confession, Eucharist, prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father, a spirit of detachment from sin, and the intention to gain the indulgence for one's self or someone in purgatory), as well as perform one of the prescribed works; a list can be found at this link:

This gift of a plenary indulgence extends particularly to the elderly, the sick, the dying, and all those who, for legitimate reasons, are unable to leave their homes, if, detached from all sin and with the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the usual conditions, recite an act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, comfort of the sick and patron of a good death, offering with confidence to God the pains and trials of their life.
