## EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME AUGUST 2, 2020

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Sacred Heart:

In today's Gospel, we see that after learning of John the Baptist's death, Jesus withdrew to a deserted place by himself. BY HIMSELF!! I find that very telling. Jesus needed some alone time! He had been tirelessly preaching the Word of God including healing many sick people. He needed rest desperately and even more so now after hearing that his dear friend, John had been murdered.

Certainly, we can all relate. There are times when we just need to be alone to reflect, rejoice, mourn, whatever the emotion we may be experiencing...and we need to be without distraction as we sort things out. Jesus likely did not have a lot of alone time because shortly afterward there he is feeding the multitude with just a few loaves of bread and fish. He picked himself up and dusted himself off and got right back to spreading His Father's Word.

We need our rest, too and after we've rested it's time for ourselves to pick ourselves back up and dust ourselves off because our fellow brothers and sisters need us to be beacons of light in this increasingly darkened world.

Last week we heard Jesus conclude his discourse with the crowds about the Kingdom of Heaven. In Matthew's narrative, Jesus then leaves the crowds and returns to Nazareth, where he is rejected. Matthew then recounts the story of John the Baptist's arrest and execution at the hands of Herod. Today's Gospel reading begins at this point.

Upon hearing the news of the death of John the Baptist, Jesus seeks to withdraw, but the crowds follow him. Jesus reaches out to them in compassion and heals the sick. At the end of a long day, the disciples encourage Jesus to send the crowds away so that they might find provisions for themselves. Jesus again responds with compassion for the crowd. Jesus tells his disciples to provide food for the crowd. The disciples reply with a report of the meagerness of their own provisions—five loaves and two fish. The result is the very familiar miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish. Matthew's Gospel tells us that 5,000 men were fed, and this number does not even include the women and children.

Jesus' blessing brought abundance from the meager provisions of the disciples. In this action, Jesus offers us a sign of the Kingdom of Heaven that he has been teaching about in the parables. A feast results from the smallest of portions—remember the mustard seed and the yeast. In this miracle we witness an example for Christian life and ministry. Even the smallest of offerings can produce abundant results when placed in the service of the Kingdom of Heaven.

We find the story of Jesus' multiplication of the loaves and the fish in each of the four Gospels. In the Gospels of Mark and Matthew, Jesus performs this same miracle on two separate occasions. The story of this miracle is an anticipation of the Eucharist in which we are fed by the abundant grace of God. The importance of the Eucharist has been a defining element of Christian life from the very beginning.

#### RENEW AND REBUILD UPDATE

As you may remember just a few short years ago in less stressful times the parish embarked on a campaign Renew and Rebuild to help our Church properties. At the time it was decided that all the pledges received would go to the preservation and repair of our beautiful Church building. We were, at the time very successful and pledges totaling, \$1,807,887 were received. As you may recall 26% percent plus the Cardinal's Appeal for that year were included in what was raised and would go directly to Archdiocese. They also received their portion first. Presently we are working with the Archdiocese to install bathrooms in the church (with an addition in the library area). As you may recall last summer the new roof promised was completed. In reviewing the status of monies needed for the installation, it became very clear that a number of donors have lapsed over the last two years in payment of their To date we have a balance owed of \$905,444.21 thru total pledge amounts and in lapsed donations of \$237,447. The impact of the loss of received payments will of course mean that we will be unable to complete all the projects we were in hopes of accomplishing with the monies. We do realize these are tough times for us all and if possible, we ask that you honor your pledge if at all possible. We also want to keep all informed of where we are in the process of honoring our commitments and accomplish all we are able. Thank you very much.

#### PHASE IV

Funeral Masses, Baptisms and Weddings are allowed. Reconciliation has begun again on Saturdays from 4 to 5pm in the Church library and will also be administered by appointment, please call the Rectory Office which is now open Monday through Thursday from 9am to 5pm, and Friday 9am to 2pm. Although permission has been granted for Church's to go to 50%, here at Sacred Heart we feel due to the lavout of the building we would be unable to maintain the 6ft, distance still required for safety. so we are keeping our current seating arrangement but will now also have the Mass live streamed into the gym where social distancing can be maintained and more of our parishioners can attend Mass feeling more confident that no further exposure with increased numbers of people attending Mass. Communion will be brought to the gym.

Please remember, that because of the ongoing health crisis, the Cardinal has *dispensed* everyone from the Sunday Mass obligation, so if you are uncomfortable about being with a group, watching Mass and a spiritual communion is still in effect.

Please observe the following when planning to attend:

- + If <u>any</u> member of your household has a fever, or is feeling ill, please remain at home.
- + If you have any pre-existing health conditions, you should remain at home at this phase.
- + Pews have been premeasured for seating with appropriate 6' social distancing in-between. Members of the same household may sit together. Available seating is marked with a green X.
- + Since seats will be filled-in <u>as people arrive</u>, there will be no choice of seating location.
- + Facial coverings (masks) must be worn to Mass.
- + To avoid contact, there will be no offertory procession or exchange of peace during the Mass.
- + The Sacred Host will be distributed in the hand only. For those who feel that receiving in the hand is unacceptable we ask that you wait to receive until the celebrant asks those who wish to receive on the tongue come forward. Please form a single line and observe the 6' social distance as you proceed down the center aisle. Disabled persons may remain seated.
- + Hand sanitizer dispensers are available on the walls of the church, and at the entrance
- + Entrance into the church is on the awning side of our building only.
- + Please exit again using social distancing due not bunch up please.
