A Word from Father...



Dear Friends,

Some of the good folks on our parish Liturgy Committee asked me to look for an opportunity to give a bit of teaching on the Sign of Peace in our liturgy. They suggested that it is good from time to time to be reminded of the significance of this ritual in the Mass so that we do it meaningfully and give it the significance that is its due. So here goes a brief attempt to respond to their request!

First things first: Where does the Sign of Peace or "Kiss of Peace" come from? At least some liturgists suggest that the Kiss of Peace originated very early in the prayer life of the Christian communities when they were still predominantly Jewish. Those early Christian-Jews, (or Jewish Christians?), would celebrate what we know as the Liturgy of the Word on the Jewish Sabbath, Saturday, and then regroup on Sunday, the First Day of the Week and the day marking the Resurrection, to celebrate the Eucharist. Before they departed on the Sabbath after sharing the Scriptures, they would offer to one another the blessing of "Shalom", a kiss or some other gesture. "Shalom" being the Hebrew word for peace, but more than just "peace" as in the absence of stress, violence, war, but "peace" in the sense of wholeness, holiness, at-one-ness with God, self, others. It is the Peace of God's Kingdom present among us even now. It was not a social greeting as much as it was a blessing or a prayer as they went off to their homes to pass the night before regathering for the Lord's Supper the next day. It echoed Jesus' own greeting to his disciples in his apparitions following the Resurrection: he inevitably said, "Peace be with you."

From there, the Kiss of Peace became a permanent fixture in the Christian liturgy, usually celebrated following the Liturgy of the Word, but later on bouncing about into other "spots" in the liturgy. There continues to be substantial discussion in liturgical circles about where the Kiss of Peace should be, many arguing that it should be restored to its venerable spot following the proclamation of the Word and before the Eucharist. In the renovation of the Missal that was recently completed, it kept its Vatican II placement following the Lord's Prayer and just before the Breaking of the Bread/Lamb of God.

More important than the "when" of the Kiss of Peace, in my opinion, is the "why" and the "how". I've touched a bit on the "why" already, so next week, I'll share a few words about the "how" ...which is what our Liturgy Committee asked me to do originally!

In the meantime, have a joyous Easter week!
