

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This week, our celebration of Advent makes a transition in ritual and texts. Beginning December 18, the countdown of nine days (a novena) to Christmas sees a heightened sense of expectation, and also a turning from the call of the Baptist in the wilderness to the events leading up to Jesus' birth. In ancient Spain, December 18 was once celebrated as the "Feast of the Expectancy," and customs grew up to heighten readiness in the homes.

Some customs arise from monastic life and practice and spill over into our parish life. Beginning tonight, those who pray Vespers will sing in the opening phrase a beautiful title of Christ. These titles belong to a collection of opening phrases called the "O Antiphons" after the aweinspired "O" sung on the first note. There's a playful code in the titles: O Wisdom, O Lord, O Flower of Jesse, O Key of David, O Dawn, O Ruler, O Emmanuel. When you take their Latin names—*Sapientia, Adonai, Radix*, and so on—the titles form an acrostic when you read them backwards: "ERO CRAS." In Latin, that is translated as "I will be there tomorrow!" It's as if Christ were answering the prayers of the waiting people in the words of the prayers themselves.

FROM THE PASTOR

The last chapter of Year 2015 unfolds with the month of December. Excitement fills the heart, mind and soul of young and old alike. Christmas is coming!

At the very beginning of our anticipation, we note the celebration of the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary on December 8th and an Advent Day of Reconciliation on Monday, December 14th. In the middle of hustle and bustle of preparation and anticipation we have a wonderful opportunity to reflect, renew and refresh our spiritual lives and relationship with Jesus Our Savior.

Pope Francis, a Holy Father of Hope, Joy, a smile and love offers us the opportunity to gift our family, ourselves and all we meet with mercy, friendship and love. Here is what he offers:

The Year of Mercy and the Holy Doors

In his papal bull announcing the forthcoming year of Mercy (Misericordiae Vultus [MV]), Pope Francis made special mention of the opening of the Holy Door at Saint Peter's Basilica. This Door opened on December 8, 2015, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, and will remain open throughout the Year of Mercy. In the same announcement, Pope Francis indicated that other holy doors would be opened throughout Rome at the other papal basilicas, as well as in cathedral churches and other designated shrines throughout the world.

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FROM THE PASTOR

The concept of the Holy door is rich in its theological meaning and historical significance. The first Holy door was designated by Pope Martin V, in 1423, at the Basilica of Saint John Lateran. A second Holy Door was opened at Saint Peter's Basilica on Christmas in the jubilee year of 1499. Since this time, Holy Doors have become a staple feature of jubilee year celebrations.

The original liturgy for the opening of the Holy door at Saint Peter's included several unique ritual elements. The rite began with the creation of an opening in one of the walls of Saint Peter's Basilica. The Holy Father himself initiated this action by striking the stones of the wall with a ceremonial hammer. As masons continued the work of deconstructing the wall in preparation for the mounting of the Holy door, the faithful would rush to gather the fragments of the bricks and cement, treating them as relics. At the conclusion of a jubilee year, the Pope would begin the process of resealing the wall by laying down several bricks and placing coins that commemorated the year into the cement.

In recent years, several changes have been made to these rites. The Holy Father no longer participates in the opening and closing of the wall, but rather, the Holy Door itself. The liturgical texts present the Door as a symbol of Christ, who described Himself as the "door for the sheep" (Jn 10:7). In his announcement of the Year of Mercy, Pope Francis added an additional dimension to this theology, referring to the Holy Door as a "Door of Mercy, through which anyone who enters will experience the love of God who consoles, pardons, and instills hope" (MV,3). The Holy Father explained that, "by crossing the threshold..., we will find the strength to embrace God's mercy and dedicate ourselves to being merciful with others as the Father has been with us" (MC, 14). In this way, the Holy Father intends the Holy Door to be a symbol of encounter with Christ, who is "the face of the Father's mercy" (MV, 1).

In the Archdiocese of New York, Cardinal Dolan has designated five Doors of Mercy where pilgrims have the opportunity to encounter this profound symbol of Christ's desire to welcome all into the Kingdom of God. These Doors may be visited at:

Saint Patrick's Cathedral in Manhattan
The Basilica of Saint Patrick's Old Cathedral in Manhattan
The Shrine Church of Saint Francis Cabrini in Manhattan
The National Shrine of Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Middletown; and
The Salesian National Shrine of Our Lady Help of Christians in Stony Point.

Pope Francis's Prayer for the Jubilee of Mercy

Lord Jesus Christ,
you have taught us to be merciful like the heavenly Father,
and have told us that whoever sees you sees Him.
Show us your face and we will be saved.
Your loving gaze freed Zacchaeus and Matthew from being enslaved by money;
the adulteress and Magdalene from seeking happiness only in
created things; made Peter weep after his betrayal,
and assured Paradise to the repentant thief.
Let us hear, as if addressed to each one of us, the words that
you spoke to the Samaritan woman: "If you knew the gift of God!"

You are the visible face of the invisible Father, of the God who manifests his power above all by forgiveness and mercy: let the Church be your visible face in the world, its Lord risen and glorified. You willed that your ministers would also be clothed in weakness in order that they may feel compassion for those in ignorance and error: let everyone who approaches them feel sought after, loved, and forgiven by God.

Send your Spirit and consecrate every one of us with its anointing, so that the Jubilee of Mercy may be a year of grace from the Lord, and your church, with renewed enthusiasm, may bring good news to the poor, proclaim liberty to captives and the oppressed, and restore sight to the blind.

We ask this through the intercession of Mary, Mother of Mercy, you who live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. Amen
