FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

“Repent and believe in the Gospel.” (Mark 1:14-20)

For those who come to church on Ash Wednesday this quote from the Gospel of Mark sounds familiar. However, we still have a few weeks until we begin the Lenten season. Today the Gospel scene takes place in the sea of Galilee where Simon and his brother Andrew are fishing. Somehow this daily and routine scene of the fishermen reminds us of our own life that occurs in our homes, our work, and our schools. It is an ordinary life that is paired with the season of Ordinary Time that is with us when we have left behind the parties of the New Year. However, the proposal of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark is that each one of us is called to change our lives: “Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.”

This Sunday we are presented with stories where God calls people, and ultimately us, to repentance, conversion, and discipleship: “Repent and believe in the Gospel.” Therefore, the message of the Scriptures and the Liturgy is that we may be able to hear and to follow the One who created us out of love. It is interesting to note that the prophet Jonah only preaches once, and the entire town of Nineveh converts. Jonah, someone who has come to be called the “reluctant prophet,” denounces the sin of the Ninevites and announces that the town will be destroyed in forty days. The Ninevites heard the message, they repent, and it will no longer be destroyed. In the same way, the Gospel proclaims the necessity of repentance and conversion. But for Jesus, his mission calls him to create a team or a group of men who commit to his message in order to change the world. It is surprising that Simon and Andrew hear Jesus, follow him, and leave everything *immediately*.

In the middle of those stories, we have the story of St Paul whose life changed on the Road to Damascus. We can say with total certainty that God does not tire of waiting for us, and that it is never too late to change. From war we can move to peace. The stories of the Ninevites and Paul prior to their conversions are stories that bred persecution, hatred, and even death. It is almost impossible to imagine these possible conversions and yet the sacred authors lead us by the hand so that we may imagine them. A few years ago, the then Archbishop of Buenos Aires used to visit a prisoner in jail and no matter how much his head said that he was in front of a murderer, his heart told him that he was in front of Christ. Christ lets himself be seen today and every day in the poor, the foreigner, and, however difficult it may seem, in those deprived of liberty. God wants to always give us an opportunity to repent and convert, but he waits for us to accept it or not.

FEAST OF ST. BLAISE - Blessing of throats will take place after all daily Masses on **Wednesday, February 3rd, 2021**. St. Blaise is given special recognition not only with a feast day, but with a unique ceremony that parallels the practice of anointing the sick. The timing for his feast is perfect as we're in the midst of cold/flu season and a pandemic, so take advantage of his intercession and receive a blessing for protection against illness. ASH WEDNESDAY; FEBRUARY 17, 2021 - Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent. Lent is a 40-day season marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The 40-day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks us to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection. The practice includes the wearing of ashes on the head. The ashes symbolize the dust from which God made us. As the priest applies the ashes to a person's forehead, he speaks the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." It is during this time that we begin a period of reflection and repentance. **MASS SCHEDULE: 8:00am & 12:05pm (English) – 6:30pm & 8:00pm (Spanish).**

FEAST OF THE CONVERSION OF SAINT PAUL, APOSTLE - Monday, January 25, 2021; Turn things around. It is arguably the biggest about-face in history: Paul goes from passionately persecuting Christians to converting to Christianity and becoming one of its most important champions. And it's a hard-to-beat conversion story: falling off a horse and encountering the risen Lord. But it's a story that happens in the hearts of Christians all the time: Life knocks you down while going the wrong way, and you're not ready, willing, or able to see the truth—and then somehow Jesus changes everything. By the grace of God, it happens to you again and again. Paul is proof that it's never too late, that you've never made too many mistakes, that you're never too far gone to keep turning yourself around.

MEMORIAL OF TIMOTHY AND TITUS, BISHOPS - Tuesday, January 26, 2021; *Seeking good companions for the journey.* We honor Timothy and Titus one day after the conversion of Saint Paul. For Paul, once converted, wasted no time in spreading the gospel and relied on many to help with his missionary work. Few of his companions were as key—or as beloved—as Timothy and Titus. Paul gave them the toughest assignments, and his letters to them are the only ones addressed to fellow missionaries that are included in the Bible. In those epistles, Paul refers to them as "my dear child" and "my true child in our common faith"—reminders that all become brothers and sisters through Christ.

MEMORIAL OF THOMAS AQUINAS, PRIEST, RELIGIOUS, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH - Thursday, January 28, 2021; Let your light shine. How apt that the gospel on today's memorial of Saint Thomas Aquinas encourages us to let our light shine. This saint's light was his powerful intellect, and it still shines brightly today. His theological writings, particularly *Summa Theologiae*, continue to have tremendous impact on the church. One of his lasting insights is that faith and reason both come from God, and Christian doctrine is not at odds with rational thought. In honor of this doctor of the church with his relentlessly probing mind, take time to sharpen your own understanding of a faith-related issue.
