# A Note about Becoming Sponsors For Baptism and Confirmation

It is a great honor to be asked to be a sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation. The role of a "godparent" is to be an "other parent" in matters of our holy Faith. That is why sponsors must be practicing Catholics, 16 years of age or older, having received Confirmation and currently living a good Christian moral life. If the sponsor is married, that person must be in a valid Church marriage. One sponsor is required for Confirmation. It is customary to have two for Baptism, in which case one must be male and the other female. A nominated sponsor is asked to get certification from his/her current parish. This is a declaration by a priest/ deacon that the individual is qualified to be a sponsor according to Church Law. To be so certified, the individual must be a current parishioner of the particular parish where the certification is being sought, and be known to the priest/deacon as being a faithful practicing Catholic, attending Mass there regularly. Unfortunately, at times, family members or friends are chosen to be sponsors with good intentions, but are found to be ineligible according to Church Law. Also, more and more, people seem to think that they are still "parishioners" of their childhood parish, where they attended school or received sacraments years ago, while no longer living in the area It is important for or attending Mass there regularly. all individuals to be active members of their local Catholic faith communities. The unfortunate fact is that some are neither practicing Catholics nor faithful members of a parish family, and are thereby ineligible to become sponsors. Like all other things in life, individual choices bring consequences. Here, at Seton, Certificates of Sponsorship are given by the pastor to registered members of the parish who are practicing Catholics and who meet the above criteria. Please see the pastor after Mass on Saturday evening or Sunday to inquire about getting a certificate.

# LIGHT A CANDLE IN CHURCH

A distinguishing characteristic of Catholic and Orthodox churches is the use of candles. They serve multiple purposes:

## 1) PROLONG PRAYERS

The main function of numerous, small candles in glass containers -- that are often displayed in racks or stands and known as votives or vigil lights -- is to maintain the intention of prayers, usually for a specific issue or person (living or deceased). Those who light them usually say a prayer over one candle at a time, and by keeping these individual candles lit for extended periods of time, the individual prayer is believed to be prolonged and amplified along with the intentions of other believers' prayers. This creates a collective spirit of prayer for the entire church that is comforting, because even when churchgoers leave, their prayers remain in the church.

## 2) SYMBOLIZE THE LIGHT OF CHRIST

Candles are also lit to symbolize the light of Christ and the Holy Trinity at liturgies such as Mass. Traditionally, these candles are made of beeswax to symbolize the purity of Christ. The number and placement of candles to be lit at the primary church altar varies greatly depending on the specific occasion.

## 3) HONOR JESUS, MARY AND THE SAINTS

Candles are lit at secondary altars and shrines in honor of Jesus, Mary and the Saints. These candles signal the prayers of petition of the faithful (see 1).

The following prayer is still used in the Cathedral of Tours, France where St. Martin was bishop from 371 – 397 AD.

LORD, THIS CANDLE THAT I HAVE LIT,
MAY IT BE LIGHT FROM YOU
TO LIGHTEN MY WAY
THROUGH DIFFICULTIES AND DECISIONS.

MAY IT BE *FIRE* FROM YOU TO BURN UP MY SELFISHNESS, MY PRIDE AND ALL THAT IS IMPURE IN ME.

MAY IT BE *FLAME* FROM YOU

TO WARM MY HEART

AND TEACH ME TO LOVE.

LORD, I CANNOT STAY
LONG IN YOUR HOUSE.
THIS CANDLE IS A LITTLE BIT
OF MYSELF THAT I OFFER TO YOU.
HELP ME TO CONTINUE MY PRAYER
IN ALL THAT I DO THIS DAY.



# THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY 2015

This Feast -- also known as the "Theophany" or "Three Kings Day" -- recalls Christ revealing Himself as Divine in three different ways: to the Magi, at His Baptism, and with His miracle at the wedding feast at Cana.



For families who practice traditions involving "the Magi" or "La Befana" leaving gifts for children, the day begins with the little ones discovering what was left for them while they slept on Twelfth Night.

It is a long standing tradition to bless and rededicate homes today. Take some Holy Water from the font (by the sacristy) if you do not have any at home. Gather the family in the main room of the house (where you spend most of your time together). A family elder recites the following prayer:

Bless, O Lord God almighty, this home, that in it there may be health, purity, the strength of victory, humility, goodness and mercy, the fulfillment of Thy law, the thanksgiving to God the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit. And may this blessing remain upon this home and upon all who dwell herein. Through Christ our Lord. The Holy Magi, Saints Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, pray for us.

After the prayer of blessing is recited, walk through the house together and bless each room by sprinkling with Holy Water. When finished, the family gathers back in the same room where you began and the group prays together:

Dear Jesus, as You led the Three Kings to You by the light of a star, please draw us ever closer to You by the light of Faith. Help us to desire You as ardently as they did. Give us the grace to overcome all the obstacles that keep us far from You. May we, like them, have something to give You when we appear before You. Mary, Our Mother, help us to know Your Son. Amen.

It is customary in some religious orders to choose a new patron Saint today for the coming year. Families can do this, too, choosing a new Saint by designating someone (e.g., father or mother, etc.) to select the new Patron, by determining by lot who will select the new patron, by having family members write down their choices and choosing at random, by allowing the person to choose who presents the best argument for a particular Patron, etc. It would be very beneficial if the person who chooses teaches the rest of the family about that particular Patron, perhaps looking up the Saint online or in the library, finding art work depicting the Saint, etc., and sharing the information.

Also, in many places the traditional *Three Kings' Cake or other cultural foods are* enjoyed by all (search on the internet for recipes.)

# EUCHARISTIC MINISTER AND LECTOR TRAINING

Seton needs more Lectors and Eucharistic Ministers! A candidate must be Catholic at least 14 years of age to become a Lector / 18 years of age to become a Eucharistic Minister, having received First Holy Communion and Confirmation. The candidate must be leading a life of faith in keeping with the function to be assumed, not bound by any canonical penalty legitimately imposed or declared, be reverential, respectful of his/her faith, and of good moral character; and if married, be in a valid marriage according to the law of the Catholic Church. Lectors should possess the necessary ability and talents to proclaim the Word of God in a clear, dignified, and effective manner. Extraordinary Ministers who will bring Holy Communion to the sick should be able to minister to the sick in a compassionate, prayerful, and sensitive way. They should possess psychological maturity and the ability to keep confidences, not discussing indiscriminately the condition of patients or their homes.


