HELP YOUR PARISH

St. Columbanus has an active, engaged and rewarding volunteer community. We are still waiting for approval to begin non-sacramental parish activities. We know the parish community will certainly be looking to get back to whatever activities they can do safely; once approval is given from the Archdiocese. There are several parish organizations which are always welcoming new members. Below are a few of them. If you have the time, please consider helping your parish; it's a rewarding experience. Call the rectory for information.

Knights of Columbanus:

Has a work crew to repair both churches and perform specific landscaping to the grounds. Raises \$30,000 per year for charities, the majority of which goes to the Parish and St. Columbanus school; along with the Putnam Valley Food Pantry. Provides about six free Communion Brunches and Grab-'N-Go Brunches for both churches.

Rosary Altar Society:

Has a crew which cleans the altar linens. Holds a few fundraisers for the Church, particularly the annual Craft Fair, which has been ongoing for over 20 years.

Columbiettes:

Holds fundraisers, and assists the parish.

Bible Study:

Monday or Wednesday groups get together to read and discuss the bible in an organized setting.

Events: The Archdiocese of New York has not yet allowed Churches to resume other activities.

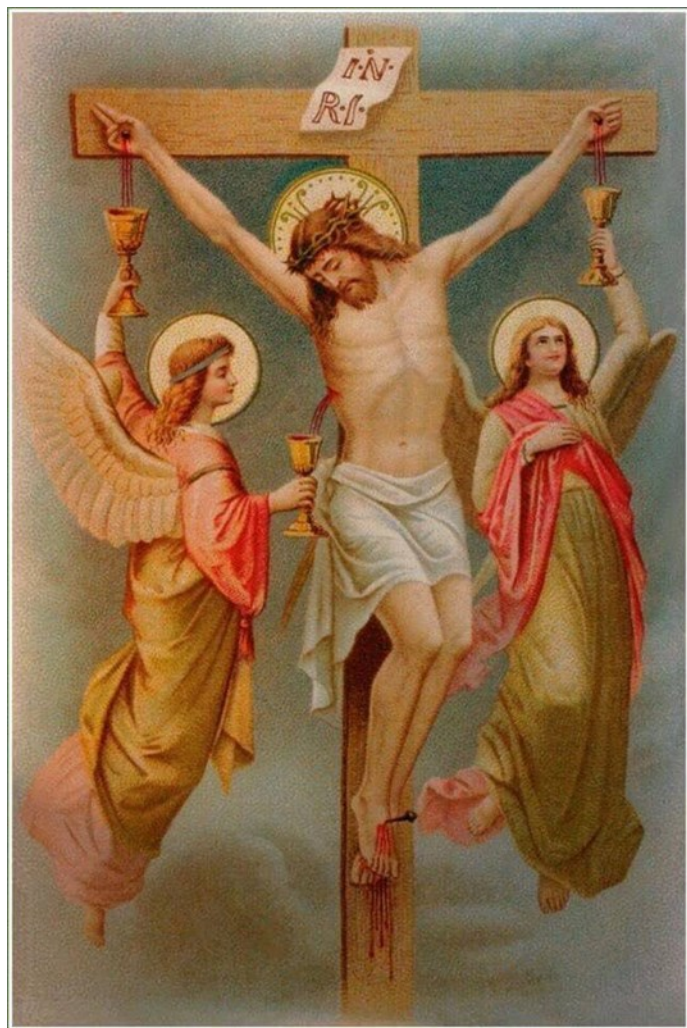
FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT ATTEND MASS

~PASTOR'S NOTES~

July 5, 2020



July is held by the Catholic Church to be the month of the Most Precious Blood of Jesus. In the new calendar of feasts the Most Precious Blood is now joined with Corpus Christi Sunday (the second Sunday after Pentecost). Its full title is the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Formerly July 1 was the feast of the Most Precious Blood. The collect for the former celebration reads:

Almighty, eternal God, who hast appointed Thine only-begotten Son to be the redeemer of the world, and hast willed to be appeased by His blood, grant us, we beseech Thee, so incessantly to worship the price of our salvation, and to be so defended by its power from the ills of this life on earth, that we may enjoy its everlasting fruit in heaven.

In our troubling times it is good to remember that Jesus poured out His most precious blood on the cross to atone for the sins of all mankind. Perhaps the greatest of all our Lord's sufferings is the neglect and indifference of people to His loving sacrifice. This is no more obvious than what is going on in the world today.

It seems that the China virus pandemic is looked upon more as an inconvenience than as a wake-up call for us to reform our lives. Indeed, we now see and hear calls for attacks on religious institutions. We've seen for a while now, especially in Europe, the vandalism and destruction of Catholic churches.

The Catholic Church is the only Church founded by Jesus Christ. It is from the Catholic Church that all the beautiful art, architecture, and music has developed. I heard a story of a man and his son who were not Catholic went to Eu-

rope. The son asked his father if the Catholic Church is the true church. His father asked his son why he would ask that question. The son replied that it was because the Catholic churches were all so beautiful.

Unfortunately, in our country we cannot say that of some of the modern churches that more resemble highway rest stops or meeting halls than structures soaring to the heavens in praise of God. All this is a result of a lack of faith for decades that has filtered down from our poor instruction and knowledge of the faith. *Nemo dat quod non habet* is the old Latin saying which means, "no one gives what he does not have." We need to learn the true faith, instill it in our children and live it in our lives.

It's time for us to "worship the price of our salvation," as the prayer says. The evils we are plagued with, both physical and moral can only be ended by conversion from selfishness and sin.

When our Lord was asked by the disciples why they could not cast out the demons, our Lord said, "that kind can only be cast out by prayer and fasting."

May the Most Precious Blood of Jesus cleanse us from our sins, selfishness, and indifference.
