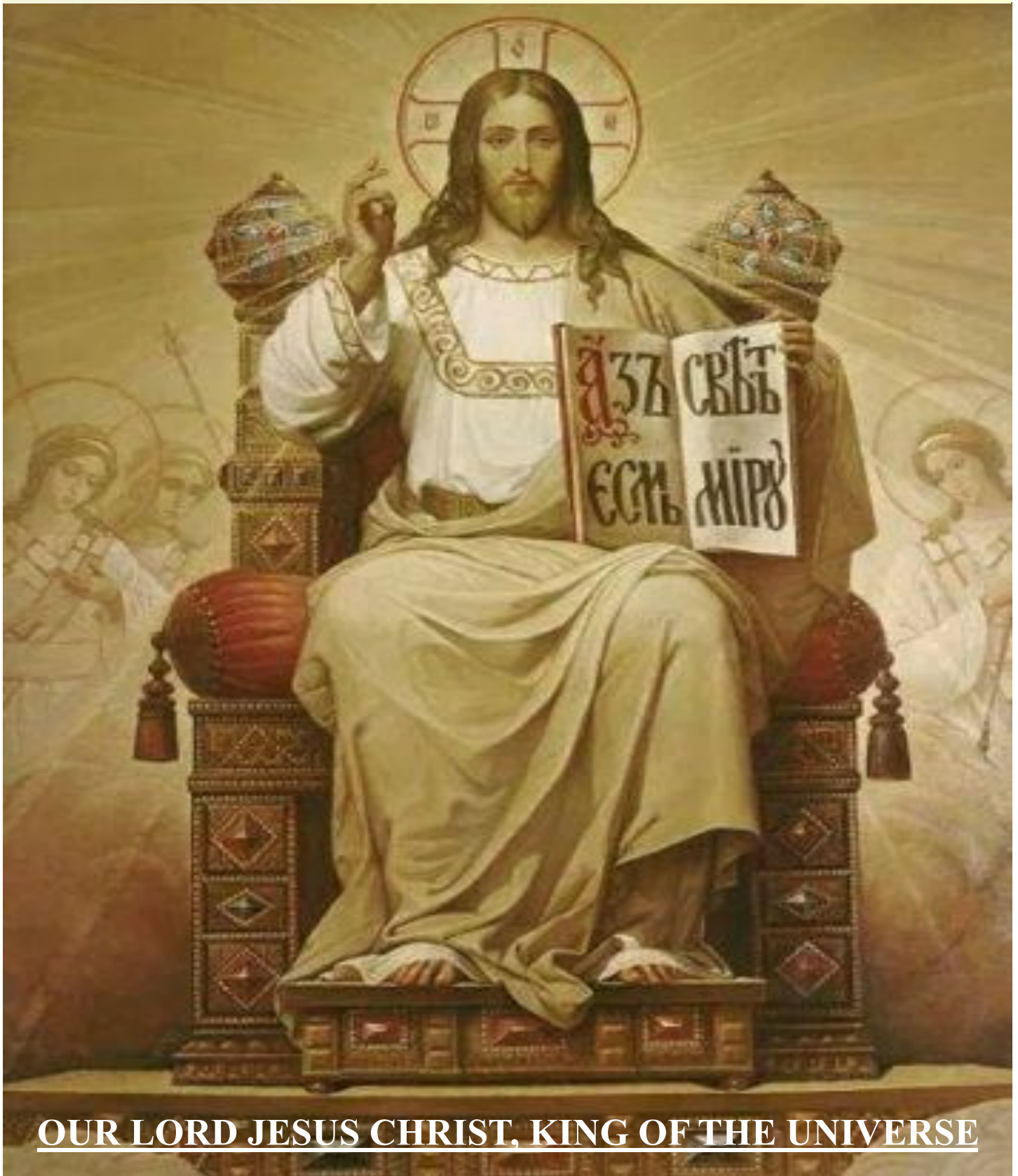

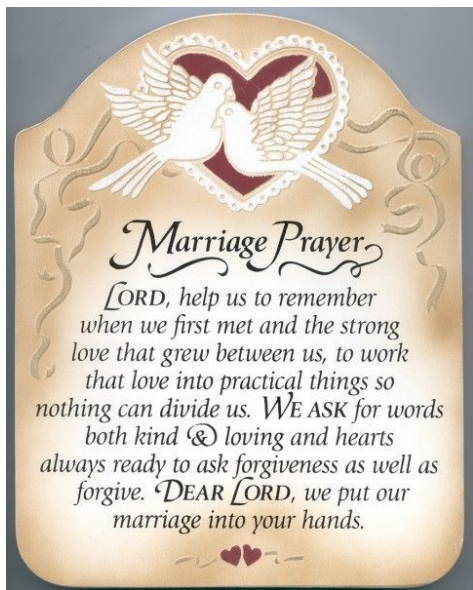
My Jesus,

HOW DO I PRAY THE ROSARY?

- Choose which of the decades you will contemplate
- Start, holding the crucifix, say the Apostles Creed
- First big bead: Our Father
- Next three small beads: Hail Mary
- Next big bead: Glory Be, then the Fatima Prayer then announce the first mystery.
- Next big bead: Our Father
- Next 10 small beads: Hail Mary
- Next big bead: Glory Be, then the Fatima Prayer then announce the second mystery.
- Repeat the routine of one Our Father, 10 Hail Mary's, a Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer, announcing next Mystery.
- When all Mysteries have been contemplated, end with a Hail Holy Queen.



WHY SHOULD I PRAY THE ROSARY?

The Rosary is a special set of prayers to God that help us to remember the most important events in the lives of Mary and Jesus. These events are called the Mysteries. There are 20 Mysteries in all: 5 are called the Joyful Mysteries, 5 are called The Luminous Mysteries, 5 are called the Sorrowful Mysteries, and 5 are called the Glorious Mysteries. These Mysteries are stories about the lives of Mary and Jesus and each group of Mysteries is called a decade.

Christ the King

I want to again thank everyone who have taken part in our Increased Of-fertory Campaign. Besides increasing our material contribution I hope we can all increase our prayers on behalf of our parish, church and country.

Thanks also to the **Knights of Columbus** who have been doing some fall cleanup around the grounds at both churches. I encourage **young men in the parish to consider joining this wonderful organization**. Just call the rectory and speak with Sean.

Today is the last Sunday of Ordinary Time and the end of the church year; and so we celebrate the Solemnity of Jesus Christ, King. Our liturgical calendar mirrors the ages from the beginning of creation until the end of time: Advent begins a new church year as we prepare for the coming of God as man (Christmas); we commemorate His life and teachings while on earth (Ordinary Time); we contemplate His redemptive act of suffering, dying, and rising from the dead (Lent and Easter); while the end of the church year reminds us that Jesus Christ will come at the end of time when, "He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His Kingdom will have no end." (Nicene Creed)

However, our Lord Jesus Christ is to rule not just at the end of time, but He is to rule all hearts and minds here and now, including countries and their governments, whether or not they be Christian. In the Old Testament God often used non-believers to accomplish His will.

We need look no further than our own country to see how corrupt it has become for having turned her back on God.

If you don't believe in God you tend to make yourself a god and so you determine what is right or wrong, good or bad. You, not God, become the creator and arbiter of rules and laws. We need look no further than the election results in some states that are no doubt fraudulent. Winning at any cost, including cheating, is okay. When I worked in a public high school I noted that students who cheated didn't feel they had done anything wrong. They felt the only mistake they could make was to get caught. But even now, those who are caught doing wrong just deny even their own words and proven actions.

There is an arrogance and hubris in the power wielding politicians of our day. They are spoiled children who have to have their way at all times and will say and do anything to maintain their power and force their often morally repugnant ideology on everyone else to justify their own embrace of immorality.

Despite all that is going on we should always take time to offer thanks to God for our faith and the blessings He has given to us all. May you all have a safe and Happy Thanksgiving.

Yes, it's time to recognize our dependence and thanks to God and to turn back to Him and turn away from sin and selfishness. It is time to acknowledge Jesus as King and Ruler of our hearts, our lives, our Church, our country and the world. It is time for our church leaders to boldly proclaim the truth without excuse or apology or fear of retribution. It is time for us to show courage by standing up for the truth, who is Jesus Christ, our Sovereign King. "Long live Christ the King!"

These last few weeks of November let us continue to pray for the faithful departed:

Eternal Father, I offer Thee the Most Precious Blood of Thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the holy souls in purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen.
